Wilder—During the past week the Wilder Fire department has set a record by answering calls on three fires in four days time. The first was Monday afternoon when a fire was discovered burning in a garage back of the old Leavell apartments. Due to the high wind the fire burned rapidly but was extinguished before spreading to the apartments or the nearby Farmer's Cash Market. Saturday the fire department was called to Morfitt's store where a small fire was found burning in a cardboard eggcase in the furnace room. There was no damage other than a little smoke, the owners said. The longest run was to the W. E. Bell farm in Fargo Friday afternoon where burning weeds set fire to corrals and baled straw. Considerable straw was destroyed but the flames did not spread to the buildings. Weiser—Numerous auto tires were deflated throughout Weiser last night by pranksters, Police Chief Tindall Ragsdale said today. This program, conducted in co-operation with the Atomic Energy Commission, will include technical tests on houses and industrial installations as well as the first field exercise ever held by civil defense workers. Vale—A large body of low-grade uranium ore has been discovered within a mile of the Vale city limits, just east of town. J. C. Kellogg of Columbus, Ohio and his partner, Bill Roney, told the Enterprise yesterday that they had staked 40 claims on Vale Butte adjacent to some 200 acres of deeded land owned by Kellogg.

Both men stressed the fact that assay reports to date had characterized the ore as low grade, but some of it is within five points of what is known as "shipping" grade. The reports, made by a laboratory at Moab, Utah, state that the Vale ore contains U308—Uranium.

The partners said that they would not consider the claims valuable at the present time if it were not for the fact that they are located very close to both highway 20 and to the railroad. They hope, however, to discover higher grade ores with the aid of scintillators, the sensitive electronics devices with which they hunt out the so-called "hot" rocks.—Malheur Enterprise

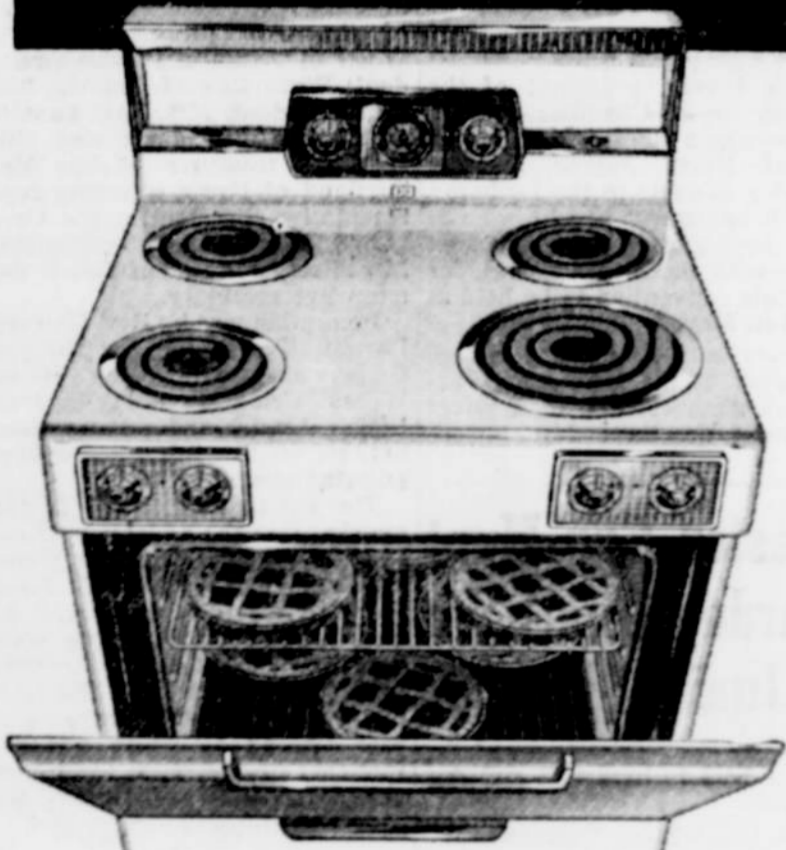
