Nyssa Thin Clads Take Meet Wed.

The Nyssa high school thinclads scored an impressive 56 points last Wednesday afternoon, to take first place in their own invitational meet. The Caldwell cougars racked up second place in the windy meet with 27 points, Emmett third with 22 points, Fruitland 13, Weiser 12, Meridian, 11; Vale, 9; Ontario, 8, and Adrian, 5.

Two of the meet's records were broken, when John Simianer tossed the javelin 169 feet to shatter the old mark of 160.6; Ron Pruyn cut the half mile a full two seconds from the old mark of 2:13.3 to 2:11.3 and Ron Cooper tied the meet record in the pole vault, when he hit a very creditable 10.2. Cooper was high scorer for the track event due to his first in the pole vault, first in the discus, tied for fourth in the javelin, and his third place in the high jump.

Warm spring weather prevailed last Tuesday afternoon when the visiting Nampa Bulldogs scored a 3-1 victory over the Bulldog nine at Hartley field. Nyssa pitcher Stan Thompson registered 6 strikeouts in the first three innings, but got in trouble in the fourth when Hill reached first on an error, Fred Correy singled and center fielder Johnson drove them both in when John Lienkaemper dropped his long drive to left field.

Johnson scored the last Nampa run when Savage errored on Murrays grounder.

Nyssa's big inning came in the bottom half of the sixth inning as Holcomb singled to left field. Schenk reached base on an error, with Nampa's starting pitcher walking Tyler and Bauman to score Holcomb from third.

Toolson was the winning pitcher striking out four Nyssa batters, walking 4 and allowing 2 hits and 1 run.

Stan Thompson for the Nyssa nine registered six strikeouts, walked 1, gave up only one hit and three runs, all unearned.

The Bulldogs take on Nampa again next Friday afternoon at Nampa.

Bill Lovejoy, Stan Thompson, and Edie Montoya combined hurling talents last Tuesday afternoon to allow only one hit, as the Bulldogs baseball squad ran roughshod over the Homedale Trojans, 17-1.

Coach Howard Lovejoy started with Rod Holcomb catching, Larry Schenk at first, Carl Tyler holding down the keystone sack, John Simianer at short-stop, Don Savage on third, with John Lienkaemper, Larry Bauman and Bill Bowen roaming the outfield pastures to round out the starting nine with Lovejoy, Thompson, and Montoya doing the chucking.

Senior short-stop John Simianer got the extra base hit of the day when he connected for a double on his first time at bat.
