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tients that formerly would have died."

"In 1924 the medium age of deaths from T.B. was 33 years while in 1950 it was 50 years. T.B. is becoming more the disease of men, particularly older men. Half of the deaths in the country are those of men 40 years of age or older. On Jan. 1st, 1954 there were 34 residents of Malheur county in the T.B. case register.

"It is conservatively estimated that every case of T.B. costs \$15,000 in care, welfare, loss of wages, etc. Most of this must come from taxes consequently T.B. control is good business and the provision of an adequate public health nursing staff to take care of the case load of patients and their families is essential to T. B. control."

The role of the Malheur County T.B. and Health association is primarily one of education to let the people know the facts about T.B. When the people understand, they will realize the necessity for appropriating sufficient funds for public health. Since we have only one public health nurse for this large county, it is vitally important that she has a staff to assist her in order to do an adequate follow-up job. Malheur county is one of the lowest in the state in the amount of money appropriated per capita for public health. In the long run, it is good business to prevent T.B. and other diseases.
