Teen Age Rod-e-o Scheduled May 7

Plans are now underway for the second annual Teenage Road-E-O with the big event tentatively scheduled for Saturday, May 7.

The Road-E-O which is sponsored by the Nyssa Jaycees and the PTA is a contest which consists of a written examination covering common sense, judgment, and various Oregon road rules. The remainder of the Road-E-O will pertain to testing the drivers ability to park, back up, drive along a straight line, and maneuver in and around various limits. Each part of the test will count half, with the contestant registering the highest total the winner.

First place winner will be eligible for the state wide competition which will be open in June provided the winner of the meet has not been guilty of a moving traffic violation in the six months prior to the state contest.

Registration for the event will be held the final three weeks preceding the contest, and registration details will be announced later. To be eligible for competition, contestants must be under twenty years of age and hold a valid learners permit or drivers license.

Nyssa high school senior Larry Bauman won the event last year but failed to qualify in the state competition.

Trackmen Garner Third At B.J.C.

The Nyssa high track team walked off with third place honors in the annual BJC invitational track meet held at Bronco stadium last Saturday afternoon. The Bulldog cinder pounders edged out a strong Elko, Nevada team by 1/6 of a point when they had garnered 20 1/3 points behind Boise who won the meet with a total of 46 5/6 points, with second place Nampa scoring 28 1/3.

Kenny Toomb who won second place in the Oregon state class A track meet at Salem last year took the high jump again this year in the Boise meet, clearing the bar at an even six feet to erase the old record of 5 feet 11 inches set by him last year.

The 220 yard dash was won by Larry Schenk who posted a time of 23.8 after he had placed third in the preliminary heats earlier in the day; altogether eight records were broken and one tied in the class A competition with Cal Wiggins of the Elko, Nev., team tracking up 15 individual points when he took first in the 100 yard dash with a time of 09.9; first in the 180 yard low hurdles and first in the broad jump. All three of these events were new records for the meet.

In the class B competition, Fruitland bested Kuna 31-28 for first place honors.
