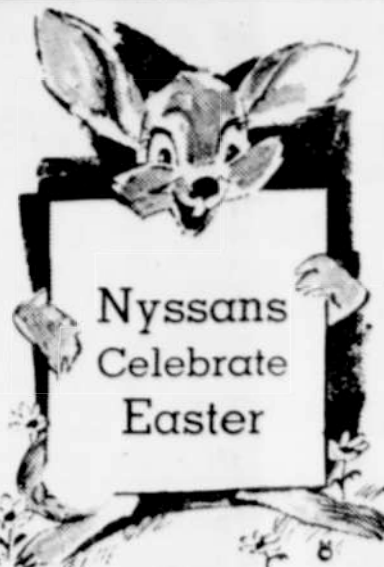

Initiation of officers will be held April 13 at Ontario. Nyssa has eight new members. Mrs. Don

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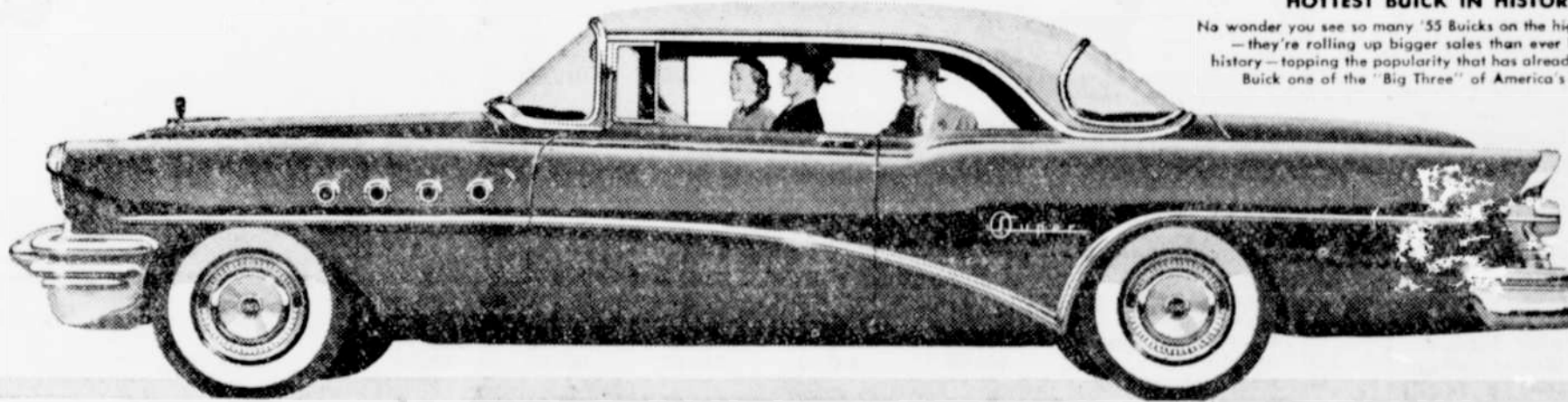
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
