Ham And Wheat Croquettes

2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
few grains pepper
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup whole wheat cereal, uncooked, instant or regular

1 cup boiling water
2 1/2 cups ground cooked ham
1/4 cup minced onion
2 tablespoons minced parsley
2 tablespoons water
1 egg, beaten
1 cup crushed corn flakes

Melt butter, add flour, salt and pepper and stir until smooth. Add milk gradually, stirring during addition. Cook over low heat until thickened, stirring constantly. Cook 5 minutes longer. Add whole wheat cereal gradually to rapidly boiling water; stir constantly until thickened; cook slowly 2 minutes. Combine white sauce, cooked whole wheat cereal, ham, onion, and parsley; mix well. Chill thoroughly. Form into 8 croquettes, 3/4 inch thick. Mix water and egg. Roll croquettes in crushed corn flakes, then in egg mixture, and again in crushed corn flakes. Bake in shallow pan in hot oven (400° F.) 20 minutes. Serve with mushroom, cheese, or tomato sauce, as desired. Yield: 8 croquettes.

would have one senator, at the present time, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Wheeler and Hood River counties, combined, have one senator. Union and Wallowa counties, combined would be entitled to one senator, and at the present, Union, Wallowa and Baker counties have but one senator. Grant and Wheeler would get one and Crook and Jefferson would also be entitled to one senator under the new plan. All the rest of the counties would be entitled to one senator each, which would add up to a total of thirty, or the same number we now have, the only difference being that they would be more fairly apportioned.

The house taxation sub-committee is drawing up a bill that would put the sales tax proposal and the income tax bill, presumably, up to the people in a special election to be held this fall.

The meat inspection bill is out of ways and means and has been transferred to the house livestock committee.

A bill passed the house which would remove weigh masters from the state highway department and put state police in charge of enforcing weight limits for trucks.

The Consultants present at the meeting were William Burke, of Altadena, Calif., Ted Crosby of Spokane, Wash., Lloyd Graybill of Twin Falls, Idaho, and Earl Evans of Winnemucca, Nev. They reported that their company is in the process of making a preliminary analysis of the effectiveness of the cloud seeding project. The Consultants, whose company contacted to do the seeding and who own the generators, began the project the first of February.

In addition to Manager Paul House, North Board members present at the meeting were Maurice Judd and Harold Henigson. The South Board was represented by Manager Willard Robinson and Claude Eachus.

Summary of Audit

Data obtained this week at the North Board of Control revealed the income and disposition of

funds as shown by the 1952 and 1953 audits by the Lincoln Kelly and company which were received Feb. 1.

A summary of the audit revealed the total income for '52 to be \$356,738.02 and for '53, \$358,233.81. This includes the income from operation and maintenance, excess water and other sources. Total expenses for these two years was \$303,089.85 for '52 and \$329,733.87 for '53. Included in these expenses are wages, power costs, operation and maintenance of the dam, materials and supplies, equipment depreciation and other costs.

Reimbursements equaled \$6,456 for '52 and \$7,054.53 for '53. This leaves a net expense of \$296,633.85 for '52 and \$322,679.32 for '53. This summary reveals that the North Board of Control realized a net book surplus in '52 of \$60,104.17 on their operation and a surplus of \$35,554.49 in '53.

Actually, since the revenue from excess water is not received until the following year, the cash surplus was considerably less.
