According to a release from the Northrop Aeronautical Institute at Inglewood, Calif., John E. Long, Jr., son of Dr. and Mrs. J. E. Long of Nyssa has been accepted for enrollment in the aircraft and engine mechanics course at their institute.

Long, a graduate of Nyssa high school, is also a veteran of the Korean War with service in the U. S. Air Force. Prior to enrolling at Northrop, he attended the College of Idaho in Caldwell.

The intensive aircraft and engine mechanics course will be completed in 50 weeks. He will then be graduated and qualified for his Civil Aeronautics Administration certificate as an "A and E" mechanic.

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
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
