Explanation In Order

Residents of Oregon deserve a plausible explanation about the lack of polio vaccine in this state and the state health department's implication that it is indefinite when the vaccine will be available.

Most neighboring states have completed immunizations or are in the process of immunizing their first and second graders, while Oregon sits with a health department issuing gobbledygook that sounds more like an alibi for red tape than an explanation about why the vaccine is not available here.

Malheur county has had two recent polio victims, both from the Jordan Valley school. Other youngsters there cannot be immunized with the new Salk vaccine because they are residents of Oregon. To be immunized with gamma globulin would cost approximately \$40 per individual according to Dr. L. A. Maulding, county health officer. The state health department indicates that Salk vaccine is not even available in Oregon for such emergencies as this.
