### Nyssa Men Listed In Service News

Lt. Lynn A. Swensen, son of Alvin C. Swensen of route two, Nyssa was recently graduated from primary pilot training at Columbus Air Force Base, Mississippi, one of nine civilian contract flying schools under the jurisdiction of the flying training air force.

Lt. Swensen is now at Greenville Air Force Base, Mississippi undergoing his final 20 weeks of single engine jet training prior to receiving his silver pilot's wings.

### County Livestock Association Meet At J. V. Apr. 30

Jordan Valley will be the host town for the semi-annual meeting of the Malheur County Livestock association starting at 2 o'clock Saturday, May 30, according to Tom McElroy, president.

The meeting, held each year, is to make last-minute plans for the county group's proposals at the state cattlemen's annual meeting, which is to be in Corvallis May 9, 10, and 11 this year. Two of the major topics to be discussed at Jordan Valley will concern whether or not Malheur county cattlemen will back the formation commission and the furtherance of a disease research program.

On the speaking program Scott Cooper, agronomist at the Squaw Butte experiment station, will discuss meadow fertilization, a practice that has more than doubled hay yields on some native meadows in Harney county. R. F. Johnson of the Caldwell experiment station will discuss the feeding of ensilage and its value, both for fattening and wintering cattle.

There will be a banquet and dance Saturday evening.

McElroy urges livestock operators to attend the meeting in Jordan Valley so that the proposals of the association at the state meeting will represent the thinking of as many producers as possible.
