Nyssa Will Host Annual SRV Meet At Hartley Field This Saturday

Nyssa high will host the annual SRV track meet to be held on Hartley field Saturday April 30. Preliminaries for the contest will begin Saturday morning at 10 o'clock with the 100 yd. dash; 220 yd. dash; low and high hurdles and the finals of the javelin on tap to begin the full day's track and field activities. The Bulldogs will enter the meet as defending champions and are also strong favorites to take the title again this year after scoring wins in every invitational meet they attended except the BJC invitational at Boise where they placed third. The Nyssa thinclads also won the SRV relays at Ontario last week scoring 40 points to their nearest rival's 27.

Nyssa track men who will participate in the SRV meet are as follows: 100 yd. dash; Buchner and Schenk; 220 yd. dash; Forbess and Schenk; 440 Forbess, 880 yd. run; Prunty; Mile; Settles and Sallee; high hurdles; Tanner and Nolen; 880 relay; Buchner, Jones, Forbess and Schenk; 440 yd. relay; Giron, Rinehart, Sanders and Tanner; mile relay; Griffiths, Lankford, Settles and Toomb; shot; Jones, Leseberg and Giron; discus; Cooper, Maxfield, and Winters; javelin; Siminiar, Jones and Savage; pole vault; Cooper, Siminiar, and Nolen; high jump; Cooper, Toomb and Drydale; and the broad jump; Buchner, Schenk, and Forbess.

Track Coach Kinsey Keveren is skeptical about the Bulldogs chances to win the meet and stated that the Ontario Tigers have improved vastly this season and will be hard to beat out for the title.

Bennett, county chairman of the committee in charge of the observance announced.

Purpose of the campaign is to focus the attention of the public in the importance of natural resources. Gov. Paul Patterson's committee on natural resources is sponsoring the campaign.

Conservation is a great public service program everyone can participate in to stimulate interest in growing more trees, preventing forest and range fires, developing more wildlife, improving fishing, wise mining of minerals, proper use of soils and waters and other aspects of natural wealth, Bennett pointed out.
