PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, At a special election held in the City of Nyssa on the 28th day of March, 1955, there was submitted to the legal voters of said City of Nyssa the proposition of adoption of a proposed amendment to the Charter of the City of Nyssa by adding thereto a new chapter authorizing the Common Council of said City of Nyssa to develop and construct a supplemental water and distribution system for said City in addition to the present water system, including pumps, installations and other essential equipment, acquisition of sites, easements and rights of way for said system; also authorizing issuance and sale of General Obligation Bonds of the City not exceeding \$123,000 to provide funds therefor, authorizing pledging of all or part of the net revenues of said system and authorizing a tax levy in sufficient amount to pay principal and interest of said bonds whenever necessary to supplement available water revenues; and

WHEREAS, the returns of said special election have been duly filed with the City Recorder and have been duly canvassed and examined by the Common Council of the City of Nyssa; and

WHEREAS, it appears that a total of 195 ballots were cast at said special election on said proposition, and that 191 ballots were cast in favor of the proposition and were marked "500 x Yes" and that 4 ballots were cast against the proposition and marked "501 x No," and that a majority of said votes cast were cast in favor of the adoption of said amendment to the Charter of the City of Nyssa.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Paul House, Mayor of the City of Nyssa, do hereby proclaim that the proposed amendment to the Charter of the City of Nyssa, as submitted to the legal voters of the

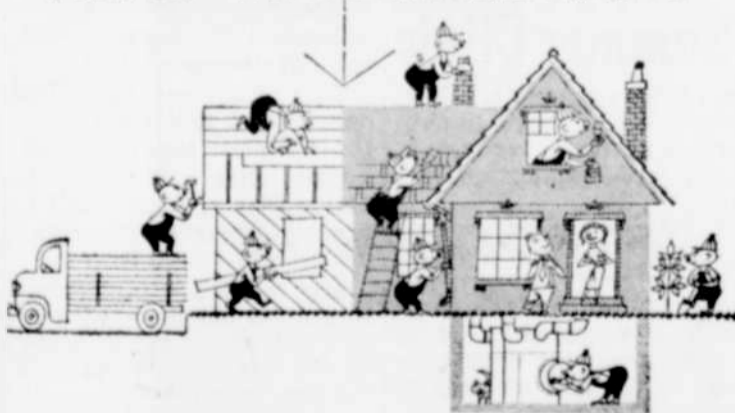
