1/2 cup sugar
1 cup hot strong black coffee
1 cup undiluted

CARNATION EVAPORATED MILK
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon rum flavoring

Dissolve gelatin and sugar in hot coffee. Chill until thickened (about 30 minutes). Chill Carnation in refrigerator tray until soft crystals form through the milk (about 15-20 minutes). Whip chilled Carnation until stiff (about 1 minute). Add lemon juice and whip very stiff. Fold whipped Carnation and flavoring into gelatin. Place in individual serving dishes or mold. Chill until firm (about 1-2 hours).

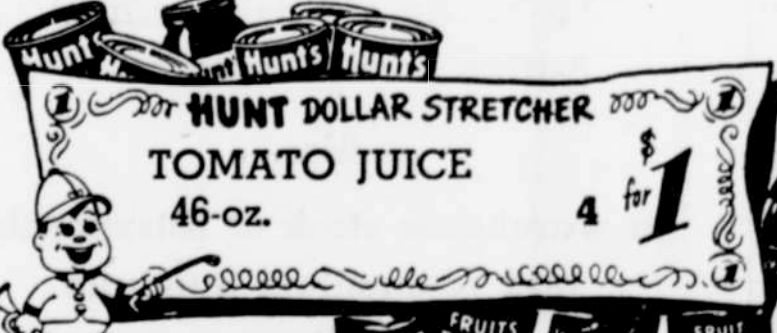

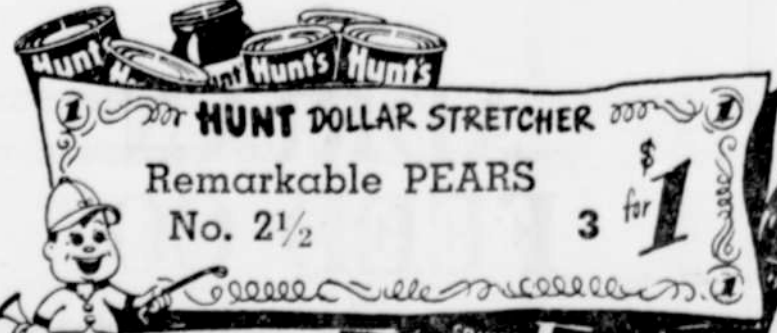
