

Harry McGinley to Be Head Coach at Nyssa High School

Harry McGinley, head basketball and assistant baseball coach at Nyssa high school for the past five years, has been appointed head football coach for the coming year to replace Howard Lovejoy, who plans to leave the coaching ranks at the end of this school year in favor of a farming enterprise at Idaho Falls, Ida. Superintendent of Nyssa schools, R. V. Wilson announced. Lovejoy has been the head man in the Nyssa coaching department for the past 11 years.

The naming of McGinley to the football post leaves the basketball and baseball positions open. Applications are now being received for these openings.

Prior to coming to Nyssa in 1950, McGinley coached at Fruitland, Redmond, Ore., Weston, Ore.; Grants, New Mex.; and Alexandria, Neb. Mr. and Mrs. McGinley have three children.

TB - Health Body Shows a Balance For Fiscal Year

For all its good work, the Malheur County Tuberculosis and Health association was still able to show a healthy balance for the fiscal year ending March 1, it was announced this week by Arthur W. Smith, president.

Out of a total of \$8886.94 the organization had in bank during the year, their remained a balance of \$3571.31 when the fiscal year ended, according to the annual report just released.

Most sizable income, the report shows, was from the sale of Christmas seals, a nationwide annual activity of the association. Prior to last Christmas, big-hearted Malheur residents bought the familiar seals to the tune of \$5133.49.

Educational Program

Health education took the biggest share of disbursements, the sum of \$2050.10 was spent to teach people that it is far wiser to prevent tuberculosis than to cure it, the report figures show.

The educational program was widespread and vigorous. A film, "TB—Everybody's Problem," was purchased and shown many times throughout the county. In cooperation with the Ontario Ministerial association, health programs were arranged in labor camps, where Spanish films were used along with pamphlets, "Care for your Health."

Radio programs entitled "Constant Invader" were broadcast and exhibits were arranged for the County Fair and the Teachers Institute.

Two scholarships were given to 4-H club members for the summer school. And a monthly newsletter, "Progress," was broadly distributed among members, various organizations, and other interested people.

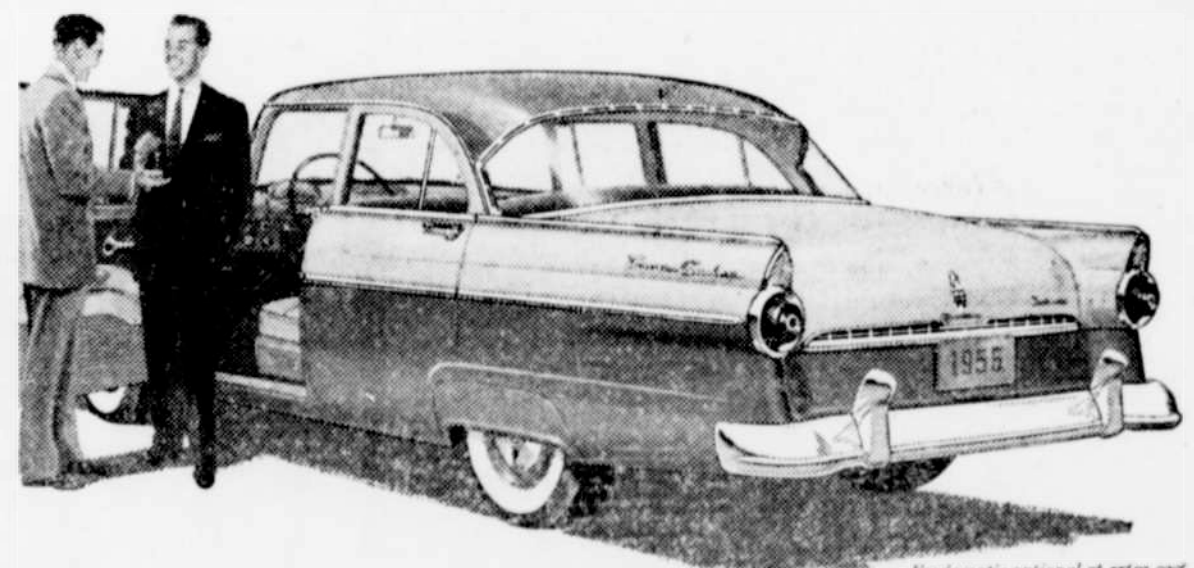
