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A High Dam Benefit

All those who oppose spending a half billion dollars or more of public funds for construction of a high dam in Hell's Canyon should consider a benefit that has not been publicized.

Sen. Wayne Morse and Sen. Richard Neuberger would have nothing to gripe about.

Sen. Morse attempted to change his tune more than a year ago when he told the senate that bread lines were forming in Oregon. He predicted dire circumstances for the multitudes and spoke so loud and so often about mounting unemployment rolls that even he believed it. His predictions proved inaccurate so he returned to his castigation of those who disagree with him about a high dam.

Sen. Neuberger also attempted a few times to talk about something other than Hell's Canyon dam. A few months ago Neuberger made an issue of white house squirrels and received nation-wide publicity, but unfortunately for him, it was the wrong kind. He again made headlines when he proposed restrictions on the use of makeup and promoters for political campaigns on TV. No one knows whether he was jesting or in dead earnest, but a lot of Oregonians were embarrassed for him.

If the high dam should be constructed Sen. Morse and Sen. Neuberger might fade into oblivion without their generalized targets to hurl the abusive charges of reactionary, vested interests, purchased press and selfish and uninformed citizenry.

Their other tunes were played off-key, but they can really harmonize when they speak of Hell's Canyon and those who disagree with them. If the dam should be approved, things would indeed be dull in the corridors of the U. S. senate.
