5 Years Ago—May 18, 1950

Donna Jean Cheldelin and Donna Clair Trabert have been named co-valetictorians of the Nyssa 1950 graduating class. — Four national park officials of the federal government were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Murle Marcum on a trip to the Owyhee dam area. When the officials arrived at the dam, they were greeted by a group of Nyssans who had driven up Saturday and set up camp and prepared a dinner for the visitors. They were Bernard Frost, Howard Smith, Sam Phillips and Klass Powell. — Russell Howell of Sunset Valley discovered a tombstone last week, while cleaning weeds close to a ditch bank near the Cow Hollow road. The inscription read "To Our Beloved Emory D. Olsen, 1849." Its location remains a mystery. Officers were notified but were unable to offer any solution.

10 Years Ago—May 17, 1945

Adrian and community led the state in the war chest drive held last October according to Bernard Anderson, county chairman. K. I. Peterson and Wm. Ashcraft were chairmen of the Adrian area. — Mrs. Hilda Tensen has been appointed as official registrar for voting in the local precincts, succeeding Grant Rinehart resigned. — Eighty-nine prisoners of war learned how to thin beats on the LDS church farm southwest of Nyssa. — W. O. Peterson of the forest service of Salmon, Ida., has resigned, and purchased an interest in the Nyssa Furniture Co. and will move his family here. — Kenneth Elliott of Adrian set a new high record, 6 feet 3 inches, for the high jump at the state track meet held at Corvallis.

15 Years Ago—May 16, 1940

Nyssa leads the county of Malheur in gain in percentage of population, for the past ten years, according to figures released by Dr. C. M. Tyler, district supervisor of the census. — Three Nyssa athletes, Stanley Ray, Duane Weeks and Jerry Warren accompanied by Coach Bob Parke left for Corvallis to attend

the state track meet. — Applications for building permits on file in the office of City Recorder M. F. Solomon total \$7650 and include two residences, the remodeling of two business buildings and one residence.

20 Years Ago—May 16, 1935

The Bureau of Reclamation is asking for bids on several buildings at Owyhee dam. There are 11 buildings including 1 house with 7 rooms. — Local musicians who won honors at the music contest in Ontario Saturday were three firsts, Helen Boydell and Alice Hashitani, voice; and Dorothy Gilchrist and Ethel Stradley, piano duet. Second place winners were Audrey Grey, violin and Colleen Towne, piano. — Last reports gave more than 300,000 acre feet of water in the Owyhee reservoir. — Twenty-two seniors will graduate from Nyssa high school May 23. — The 3rd annual Owyhee Canyon Days passed into history Saturday evening as a successful event.

25 Years Ago—May 21, 1930

Special education for socially unadjusted and emotionally disturbed children was studied at a meeting held under the direction of the state department of education in Klamath Falls last Friday and Saturday.

Nyssa was represented at the meeting by Mrs. Josephine Rigney.

Teachers, doctors, public health nurses and others who are working in the interests of handicapped children attended the convocation. Total registration was about 400.

Speakers who urged a broader educational program for handicapped youngsters included Dr. S. Harvard Jaufman, director of the Psychiatric Clinic for Children, University of Washington; Angelo M. Pellegrini, associate professor of English, University of Washington; Dr. Gordon Edwards, director of the division of preventative medicine; Oregon state board of health; Dr. Waterman, director of mental health, Oregon state board of health, and Mrs. Joy Hills Subser, assistant superintendent of schools, state department of education.
