Nyssa Trackmen Go to Corvallis For State Meet

An eight-man Bulldog team was to leave for Corvallis today (Thursday) to let their feet fly in the eastern Oregon district track meet scheduled for Friday and Saturday.

It's the largest team ever to qualify from Nyssa.

The runners point out that if the state were split up into three divisions in track, as it is in football, the Bulldogs would have a good chance at the state championships.

As it is, they are informed by the state board that they must compete in class A-1 again this year, as in the past. They expect to be placed into division A-2 next year.

Nyssa placed third in the qualifying rounds, being nosed out by Pendleton, which ranked first, and LaGrande, second.

Members of the team making the trip to Corvallis are Ronald Forbess, 440 yard run; Roscoe Turner, 180 yard low hurdles; John Simianer, javelin and Ronald Cooper, pole vault.

The relay team, to run 880 yards consists of Ronald Buchner, Larry Schenk, Farrell Jones and Forbess.

Adrian—The Adrian high school Antelopes won the Oregon class B district baseball championship when they defeated Cove, 6 to 1 in a game played at Union Monday afternoon. This victory entitles them to vie for the regional championship to be determined in a tourney beginning Friday at Adrian. The Antelopes will be pitted against the winners of the Mt. Vernon-Echo game played Tuesday afternoon.

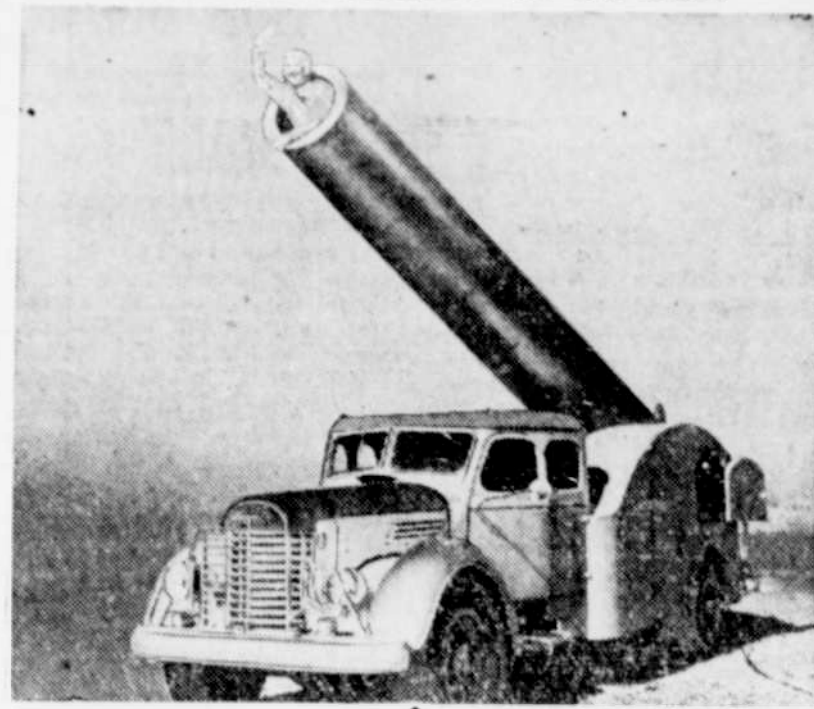
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Live "Ammunition" to be Shot

Mrs. O'Toole Takes National Exam Sat.

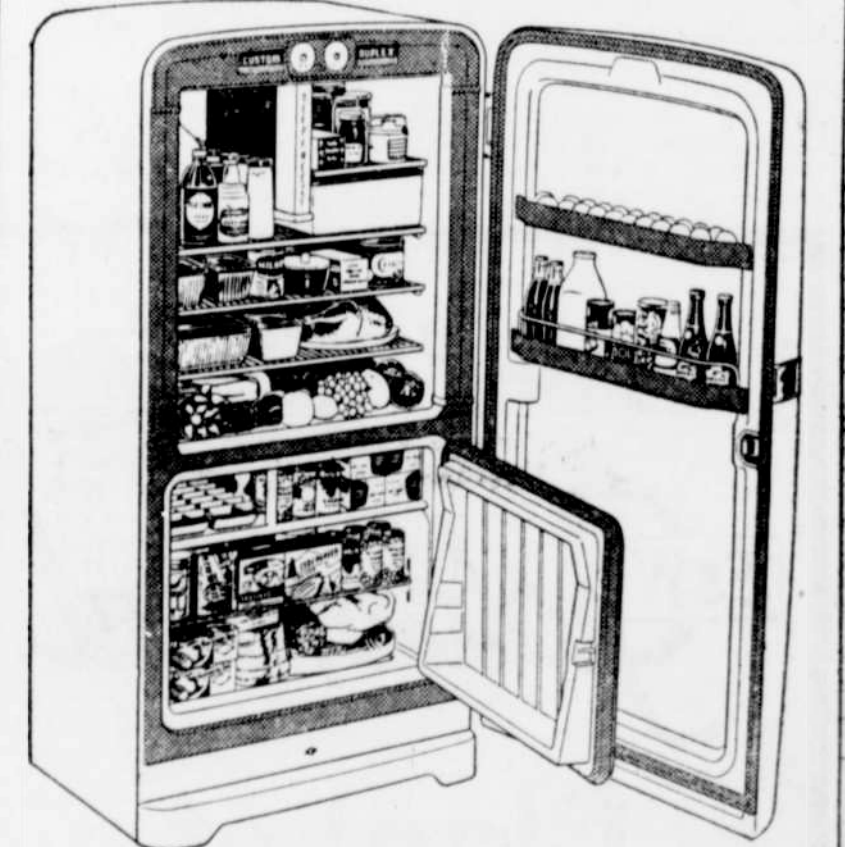
Mr. and Mrs. John O'Toole were in Portland during the past weekend where Mrs. O'Toole took the national examination for anesthetists.
