A long-past-due bouquet is due faculty members, not because they are school teachers, but because they are doing an excellent job of setting good examples for boys and girls attending school.

The Journal was greatly impressed a few weeks ago when the Nyssa Education association voted not to ask for salary increases. They first considered the economy of the community, the pending school construction program which will require more taxes, and the fact that all other property taxes are extremely high.

Juvenile crime is almost unheard of in the Nyssa community and without doubt, the educators can be credited with the kind of leadership that has directed youthful activities into their proper channels.

Another creditable aspect, in which the community itself shares the honors, is the extremely small turnover of faculty members each year. Their increment pay, brought about because teachers here are making careers of their profession rather than stepping stones to something better, places them in the upper brackets of the entire lower Snake river valley insofar as teacher salaries are concerned.

Unlike some communities, no one here ever feels sorry for "the poor school teachers", because they never feel sorry for themselves. They take part in community activities because they are a definite part of the community which is so active that it has no time for petty bickering that is all too prevalent in some localities.

We'll be looking forward to next fall when the community's center of attraction is buzzing with activity and 53 educators are guiding our youngsters.
