He has been connected with the plant of the Clover Lawn Dairy and expects to continue dairy work in Springfield.

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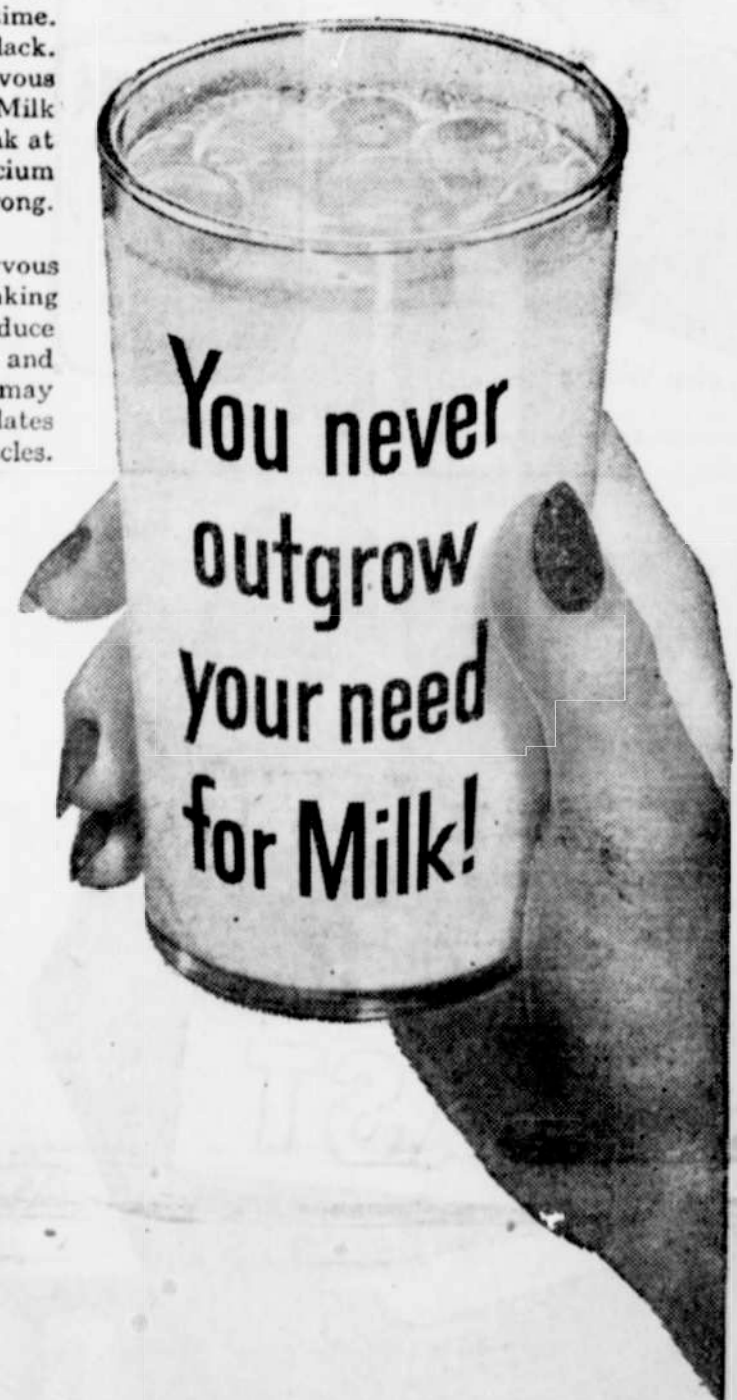
