

Kids Recreation Program to Open At Park Monday

Next Monday and Tuesday, June 13 and 14, will be registration days at City Park for boys and girls who will take part in activities of the summer recreation program, designed to give guided sports and play for youngsters each weekday from 9 to 12 and from 1 to 4.

Dick Carrow, summer recreation director, and his assistant, Ann House, are planning a variety of interests for children of from 6 to 14 years old.

The children will be separated into three groups — ages 8 to 10, peewee, 11 to 12, midlets, and 13 to 14, juniors, with toddlers being grouped separately for supervised play.

On next Wednesday, June 15, the program will begin, with a greased pig chase for boys, sack races, relays, tug-of-war, bicycle races, pie eating contest, soft ball, ping pong, croquet, and other games.

Games Scheduled

Recreation league games will be played on Monday and Wednesday mornings, and on June 20, a course in handicraft will be given afternoons.

Swimming, which will include competent instruction, will begin Tuesday, June 21. Youngsters who have written permission from their parents will be taken to the Ontario pool by bus on each Tuesday and Friday afternoon. Cost of the swimming trip is 10 cents for children 6 to 12, 20 cents for children 12 through high school age, and 35 cents for those above high school. An additional 10 cents bus fare will be charged.

A track meet will be held on June 29, to be followed by tennis, ping pong and checker tournaments in following weeks. Carrow announced. In addition to scheduled activities, there will be equipment available for softball, volleyball ball, badminton, tennis, ping pong, drawing, checkers, croquet and other games.

Safer 'Certified Mail' Service Started Here

A new certified mail service is starting in Nyssa and other sections, to be effective next Tuesday, June 14. Postmaster Lloyd Lewis announces.

The service will give added safeguard to special letters, at half the cost of the familiar registered mail. Registration minimum is 30 cents; the certified letter will cost 15 cents.

The certified mail will institute a change in procedure and handling, but will have the same delivery restrictions as registered mail. The mail must be signed for on delivery, as is required for registered letters.
