It is apparent that individuals and business firms are taking a second look at the economic picture and are again investing with money that has been lying idle or drawing small interest rates. More large and small businesses are expanding to keep up with population growth and they are showing aside the fear that it might be dangerous to spend borrowed money.

New businesses are venturing into the field, but in most instances there is planning and experience behind the ventures to reduce chances of high fatality rate of the plungers who cropped out immediately after World War II.

A new water system will allow the town to quadruple in size, long-range street improvement plans will keep pace with expected growth and school expansion is geared to normal population increases of the community with little or no danger of stripping the gears in the event of an unexpected influx of new people.

These plans for the future have been made without back-breaking financial obligations on the part of existing taxpayers.
