Burglars Break Into Smoke Shop But Miss Money

Burglars broke into the Smoke Shop, 11 So. First St., during the early hours of last Monday, for the first violent entry into a business house in a year or more.

They made off with three cases of beer, nine bottles of wine and nine cartons of cigarettes, but missed weekend receipts which had been removed from the cash register.

The burglars gained entrance through a rear door. First prying off a cooling system installed in a window, and damaging it, they were confronted with iron bars and abandoned that means of entry.

Then they cut a hole through the screen door and pried open the door.

Don Parker, owner of the Smoke Shop, said the damage done amounted to more than the loot stolen. Vain efforts were made to jimmy open a pin ball machine and a juke box, for possible money in the coin boxes. The cash register also was torn open in a search for secret receptacles for hiding money.

City and state police were called in and finger prints were taken to be forwarded to the FBI in Washington.

Police expressed the belief that the burglary was perpetrated by amateurs.
