Government price support of farm crops came up for vigorous pro and con discussion at the regular meeting of the Oregon Trail Grange, at Oregon Trail hall last Thursday night.

O. E. Cheldelin led the argument in favor of support, asserting his doubt that farmers can make it alone, but Alva Goodell, on the other hand, argued for a supply and demand basis of crop marketing. Frank Parr discussed surplus materials that we can "eat, sell or give away."

"Pile up a surplus and just a trickle goes out, and we end up the year with more than we started with."

Few farmers are affected by price supports, he declared — it is the big business farmer who "produces crops no one can use and gets a lot of money under support."

At the conclusion of his talk, Parr changed the subject and signed up Grangers present to donate blood to the Red Cross blood bank.

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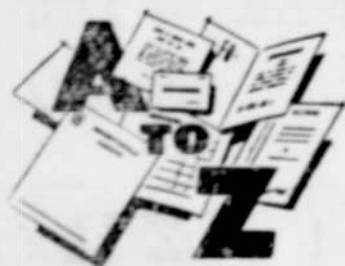


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Can Some Goods For M.M. Hospital Auxiliary Asks

The Midway, operating with the 7th Fleet, has traveled some 28,000 miles and has visited Cape Town, South Africa; Colombo, Ceylon; Hong Kong; Manila; and Subic Bay in the Philippines; and Yokosuka, Japan.

Two weeks were spent in Yokosuka, allowing the Midway's 3,400 crew members to visit to Tokyo, Yokohama and Kamakura during the cherry blossom season. At Kamakura, city of shrines, they viewed the colorful processions during the birthday of Buddha festival.

The Midway is scheduled to return to the U.S. this summer for overhaul and modernization at the Naval Shipyard, Bremerton, Wash.

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Chief Hansen Joins Posse 10,000-ft. Peak Climb by Horseback

Police Chief E. L. Hansen, former sheriff of Franklin county, Idaho, returned to Nyssa Monday after a weekend horseback ride that took the Idaho county's sheriff's posse over rugged Sherman Peak, which has an elevation of 10,000.

The chief had returned to Preston, Idaho for a reunion with some of his old friends and to ride with the 30-man posse over the mountain.

He reported considerable snow, with some of the trails still blocked and requiring detour. Camping was in the open.

On his return, Chief Hansen brought back his riding horse, Invasion, which has been kept near Preston since Hansen came to Nyssa to take the chief's job. The horse was so named because it was born on the day and hour of the Yanks' invasion of France.

Nyssa Spared, State Traffic Toll Is 30

May traffic accidents took 30 lives in Oregon. Secretary of State Earl T. Newby reported Thursday, but not one fatality was listed in Nyssa.

The May count, four fewer than the number of fatalities recorded in May a year ago, brings the toll for the year to 133. Traffic deaths totalled 148 at the end of May, 1954.

The number of persons injured has edged up this year. Newby said. Through April, 4,934 injury cases had been reported as compared with 3,369 at the same time last year.

The total number of accidents of all types, however, dropped slightly from the 18,783 mishaps reported during the first four months of 1954.

Newby said traffic fatalities must be held to 30 or less during the critical summer months if Oregon is to better last year's death record. The best way to accomplish this, he contended, is for all drivers to take seriously the 1955 watchword of the highways—"Slow Down and Live."

Nyssa Guardsmen Awarded Honors At Summer Camp

National Guardsmen of Nyssa, members of Company H of the famed 41st Infantry division, were back home this week after a summer encampment at which they received many honors.

The company was given the honor rating every day of the encampment at Fort Lewis, Wash., competing against five other companies of the division for daily inspection.

First Lieut. Paul Hiral, Nyssa rancher, was given a superior rating in range officer detail, as were First Lieut. James A. Cables and Second Lieut. Burt Humphries, of Ontario.

The company also was given a superior unit flag to accompany the duddon which was won at last year's encampment.

The summer's encampment was a rigorous one, the men reported, but they enjoyed every minute of it. Their return was delayed a couple of hours, due to a railway accident of a preceding train, just outside of La Grande. The men were taken into Ontario by bus.

Cherry Fruit Fly Quarantine Removed

Effective last Saturday, the state department of agriculture removed the intra-state and interstate quarantines Oregon has maintained against the cherry fruit fly. This means fresh cherries may move freely within the state and also cherries from infested counties in Washington and Idaho may also come into Oregon.

Controls so perfected that quarantines are no longer needed, J. F. Short, director of agriculture, said in signing the repeal orders. The department has also repealed the 18-year-old quarantine against the East Indian bean borer and has amended the azalea flower spot quarantine. The latter now includes Virginia and Maryland and all of California except Humboldt county as newly infested territory.

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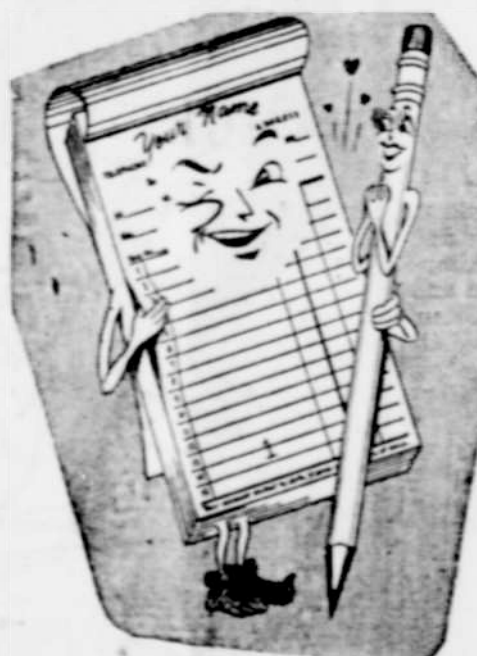
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Parks, Highways To Be Inspected

The Oregon State Highway commission will make its second 1955 inspection trip of highways and state parks beginning July 11, it was announced this week.

The commission, accompanied by representatives of the press, highway interim committee, parks advisory committee, state parks superintendent and representatives of the Bureau of Public Roads, U. S. Forest Service and Oregon Automobile club will leave Portland on U. S. highway 30, inspecting state parks and the Columbia river highway enroute.

On July 12, the group will inspect Wallowa Lake State park and other parks and highways enroute to Ontario for overnight. New locations on U. S. 30 between Baker and Ontario will be inspected.

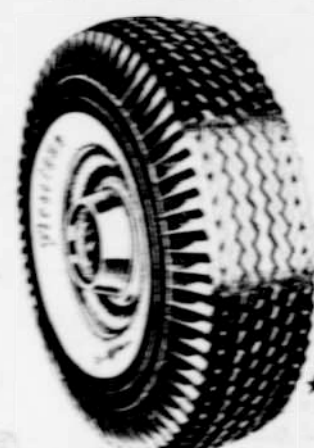
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
