Diamond Lake Filled With Fighting Trout

The second phase of the Oregon State Game Commission's Diamond Lake rehabilitation program got under way yesterday, (Wednesday), with the initial stocking of 151,000 Kamloops trout, according to word from Bob Borovicka, district fishery agent, Bend, Ore.

The Kamloops, known as a "fighting strain of rainbow," were reared at the game commission's Wizard Falls hatchery and now average 4 to 5 inches in length. Four liberation units hauled the trout from the Wizard Falls hatch to release points at the lake.

Diamond Lake, a stopover for many Nyssa fishermen on their way west, will not be open for fishing this year. Plans call for re-opening the lake to fishing in 1956.

July 1 Deadline For Seed Okay

Certification rules and regulations along with application blanks are available at the county extension office.

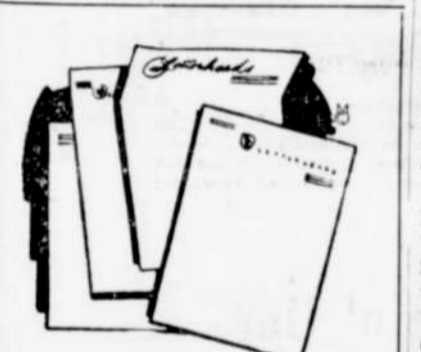
Two Nyssans Make College Honor Roll

Jet Plane Gives Nyssans Jeebies

Many Nyssa residents were reported to have had "sore necks" Wednesday after they rushed from their homes and businesses shortly after noon Tuesday in an effort to spot a jet plane that buzzed the town.

Low clouds and terrific speed made it impossible to see the plane that "sounded like it was going to land right on Main street." The screaming of the high-speed craft began suddenly and ended the same way.

About six weeks ago, two jet planes made three passes at the town one evening to indicate that friends or relatives of the pilots were being saluted.

State Asks Bids For Two Bridges

The State Highway commission, meeting in Portland on July 1, will receive bids for the construction of two concrete structures in Malheur county. One is a bridge over Malheur river and the other a reinforced concrete highway grade separation structure, both being on the relocated Olds Ferry-Ontario section of U. S. 30. The separation structure takes the new alignment of the Old Oregon Trail highway over Stanton Boulevard, about 2 1/2 miles north of Ontario.

The State Highway commission will receive bids at its next regular meeting on June 30 for the construction of about 41 miles of pavement seal coat on sections of the I. O. N., Central Oregon and Little Sheep Creek Highways in Malheur and Wallowa counties.

Good Angling News! Odds Up on the Limit

Anglers now have more than 1,200,000 additional chances toward making limit catches, the Oregon State Game Commission reports.

According to Reino Koski, chief of fish liberations, this is the number of trout and steelhead of legal size which have been planted so far this spring in the streams, lakes, and reservoirs of the state. An additional 538,000 fry and fingerlings have also been planted with most of these fish released into lakes and reservoirs.

Liberation crews will continue operations in most of the major streams throughout the summer, the commission advises. Legal cutthroat and steelhead are now being released in most of the coastal streams.

Plans now call for more than 11 million trout, steelhead, and salmon, of which 3 million are of catchable size, to be liberated from game commission hatcheries during the planting season.

Malheur Sheriff Posse Appears Last Sunday

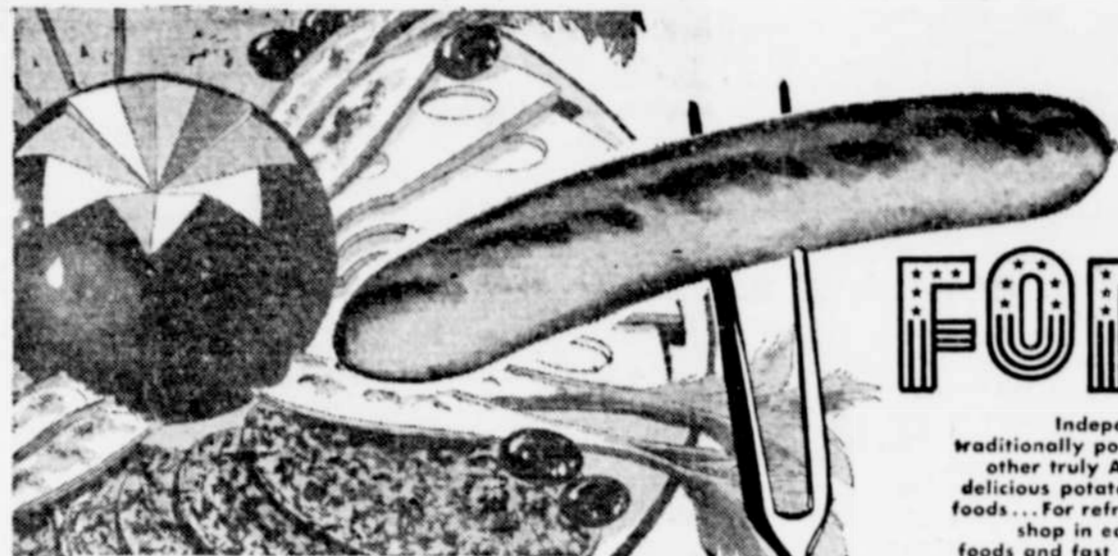
