**Pressure Groups Fear The "Federal" Plan**  
(Malheur Enterprise)

The Oregon Farmer Union, mouthpiece for the left-wing Farmer Union in this state, is outraged because the Oregon State Grange at its recent convention voted in favor of the "federal" plan of legislative reapportionment, a proposal which would do away with the current inequality of representation, by which both senators and representatives are elected on a population basis, and would institute a system based on the United States federal plan.

The Farmer Union would prefer to see the preponderance of legislative power rest with the highly urban areas of the state because it makes for easier manipulation of the legislature by highly-organized pressure groups . . . groups exactly like the Farmer Union.

Ask any representative at Salem who it is that has the greatest freedom of personal judgement, the representatives of rural areas, or those from highly populated areas? He will tell you without hesitation that the political pressure groups exerted on Multnomah county lawmakers, for instance, would quickly lead to much capricious, irresponsible legislation were it not for the stability given the assembly by its rural contingent.

"Under the mis-named 'federal' plan, each county would elect one senator," cries the Oregon Farmer Union. "Multnomah county with a population of 471,000 would elect one senator—the same as little Sherman county with a population of 2,271. The 4,783 people in Morrow county would have the same voice in the Senate as the 101,000 people in Marion county. This, of course is an absurdity in any system of government which purports to be a democracy."

"Absurdity" or not, this is exactly the system the United States have found soundly adaptable to the democratic form of government, and it adds nothing to the Farmer Union argument to plead that the states are "sovereign units" while the counties are only creations of the state.

The argument is silly, for the analogy of the counties and states in comparison to the states and the United States federal government is a political reality. In a democracy not only are the people represented, but the many diverse areas of the country are represented as well in order that one area may not subjugate another through a type of internal colonialism imposed by the many upon the few.

The Oregon Farmer Union, like all professionally "progressive" groups sees trouble ahead for much of its special interest legislation should all of Oregon attain full rep-
