

Drunk Driving Charges Get 3 In Bad With Law

One man is at liberty with the promise of his employer to pay a \$100 fine and another is at liberty period following their arrest by city police on separate drunk-driving charges Wednesday of last week.

Raymond Grieg, charged with driving while under the influence, appeared before Police Judge J. C. Smith and was fined \$100. The man was released when his employer promised the court that an amount equal to the fine would be withheld from his wages.

Butler, who was arrested on the same charges when he allegedly drove his car onto a sidewalk on South First street, was fined \$100 and released with his car left as security. Chief of Police E. L. Hansen said that Butler had left town and has not yet been located.

Heavy Docket

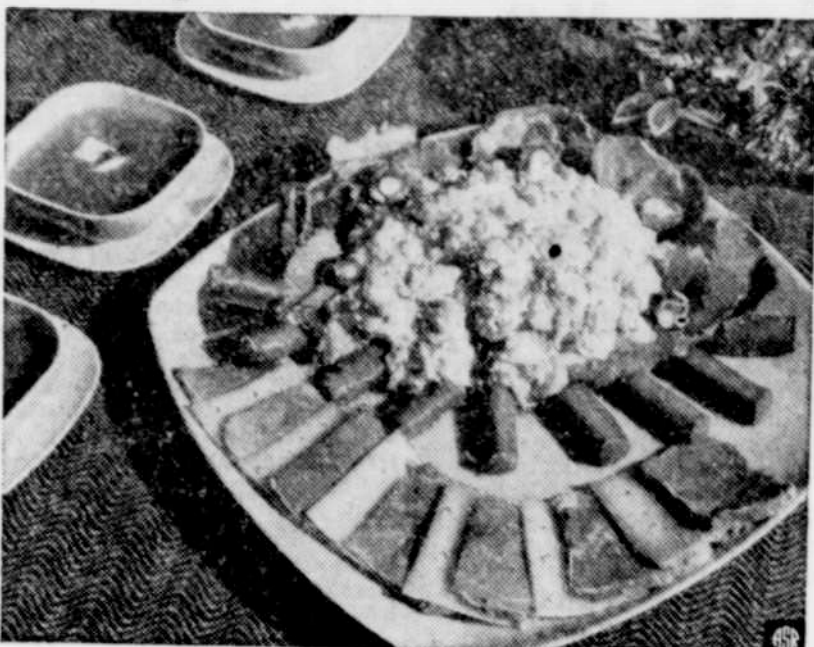
In the justice court, Justice Don M. Graham reported an extremely heavy docket during the past week which included seven criminal cases since last Saturday. Appearing before Judge Graham Monday was Carlos Rios, arrested by city police and charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor and for resisting arrest. Rios was bound over to the circuit court and is being held in lieu of \$200 bail. Tony Apodaca, arrested at the same time and charged with being drunk in a public place and carrying a concealed weapon, was bound over to the circuit court and is being held in lieu of \$100 bail.

Fred Whitly, also arrested by city police, appeared in the justice court charged with assaulting Benjamin E. Graza and is being held for the circuit court. On Saturday Bennie J. Manning appeared before Judge Graham on charges of disorderly conduct and creating a disturbance and damaging property at the Nyssa labor camp. His bail was set at \$75 and he is being held for the circuit court.

1/2 cup mayonnaise 2 tablespoons pimiento strips
2 tablespoons prepared mustard 1 cup thinly sliced celery
2 cans (16 oz. each) white potatoes 1 small onion
3 hard cooked eggs Seasoned salt
1/4 cup chopped ripe olives Freshly ground pepper
Combine mayonnaise and mustard; add drained potatoes, cut in cubes. Chill 2 to 3 hours to blend flavors. Add coarsely cut eggs, olives, pimiento, celery and diced onion. Season to taste. Chill. Serve on crisp greens. Six generous servings.

Irvin Brainard Allen, 80, a former Nyssa resident, died June 18 at Amarillo, Texas where he had been residing about six weeks after moving from Fairview, Missouri.

Mr. Allen resided here several years prior to moving to Missouri, having sold his homestead northwest of Nyssa to Herb Fisher. He was born August 9, 1874 in Wisconsin. He was a member of the Methodist church and Albert Pike lodge 117, AF and FM in Denver where he had been manager of a hotel.

Survivors include his wife, Rebecca Jane of Fairview, Mo., a daughter, Mrs. Rosemary Green of Amarillo and a son, Irwin B. Allen, Jr., of South America.

Funeral services and interment were conducted in Denver.

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Poultry Program Shows New High In Breeding Hens

A record number of breeding hens, 601,355, and the second highest number of flocks, 964, were enrolled in the Oregon poultry improvement program in the year ending July 1, the state department of agriculture reports.

This is 158 more flocks and 113,887 more birds than participated in 1953-54. A comparison with the 1945 figures, when the department took over the program, shows about 160,000 more chickens participating but 312 fewer flocks. In 1945-55 hatcheries were under the program; last year, 63. Hatcheries last year had a capacity of 3,599,248 chicks; this tops 1945 by almost half a million.

Last year .012 per cent of the birds were pullorum disease reactors; a year earlier, .010 per cent. But even the slight increase meant only 73 birds of the 601,355 tested last year were reactors.

It shows, for one thing, that more cross breeding has developed in attempts to get better and broader chicks. The expansion of the broiler industry is largely responsible for this change, says Earl Reitsma, supervisor of this work. Also, more cross breeding and strain crossing is done to develop increased egg production.

Four Scholarships to Send Boys to Range Management Camp are Offered

Scholarships to send four boys to this year's range management camp are being provided by local organizations, according to George Russell, county committeemen of the American Society of Range management.

The Malheur Cattlemen and the Malheur Woolgrowers are cooperating in providing two of these scholarships. The Malheur county Farm Bureau is providing one, and the fourth will be given by the Malheur county Pamonza Grange.

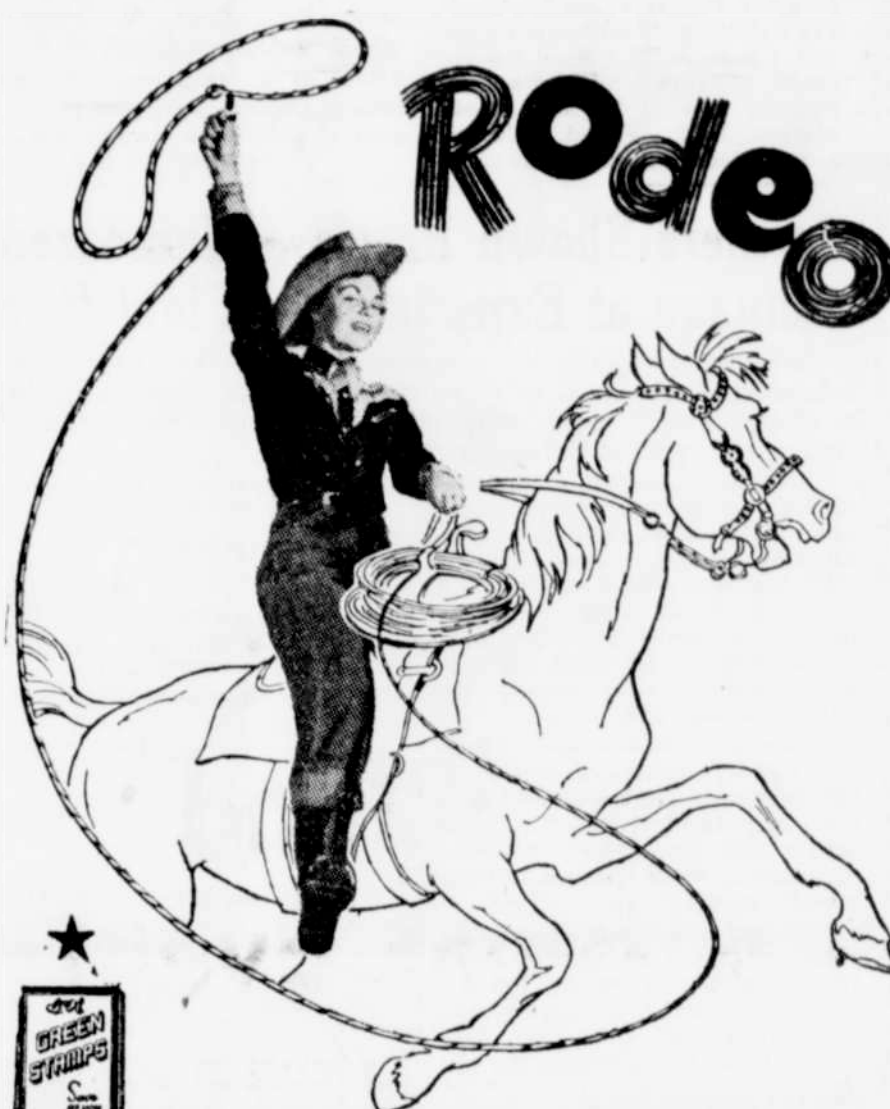
These scholarships are open to any boy in Malheur county between the ages of 14 and 18 years inclusive. Interested individuals should send their applications to E. M. Hauser, county extension agent, Ontario, and should give their name, address, age and whether they live in town or on a farm. All these applications must be in before July 20, as delegates will be selected on that date. The camp this year is scheduled for August 1 to August 6 inclusive, and will be held in Logan Valley in Grant county.

Subjects taught at camp include both range management and woodcraft. Officials of the Range Management society, state extension service, soil conservation service and forest service help to make this a memorable outing for the boys attending.

A local committee, headed by Russell, will pass on all applications on July 20 and will select the four boys to attend camp on the scholarship being given by the sponsoring organizations.

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
