

Opinions Differ On Later Potato Prices; Early Reports Not Good

There was a difference of opinion among potato growers as well as local shippers regarding future spud prices, although they were in agreement that the market at the present time "is not very good."

The county agent's office said that no early potato reports are being issued until next Monday when the market news service of the USDA will issue a daily report, which will also include onions. The announcement was made by Turner Bond, county extension agent. Reports will be issued each day except Saturday until mid September, covering prices, shipments and other information provided by the USDA, the Idaho State Department of Agriculture and the Malheur Potato Growers association.

The bulletins are available to anyone furnishing their name and address to the county agent's office in Ontario.

In the Nyssa community growers were somewhat pessimistic about prices because of a reportedly good crop in almost all spud growing areas. Quality of potatoes is reported to be excellent here, but the yield is expected to be somewhat less than last year because of weather conditions. The acreage in the county is about the same as it was last year, according to the county

The christening will be done Sunday by movie actress Irene Dunn.

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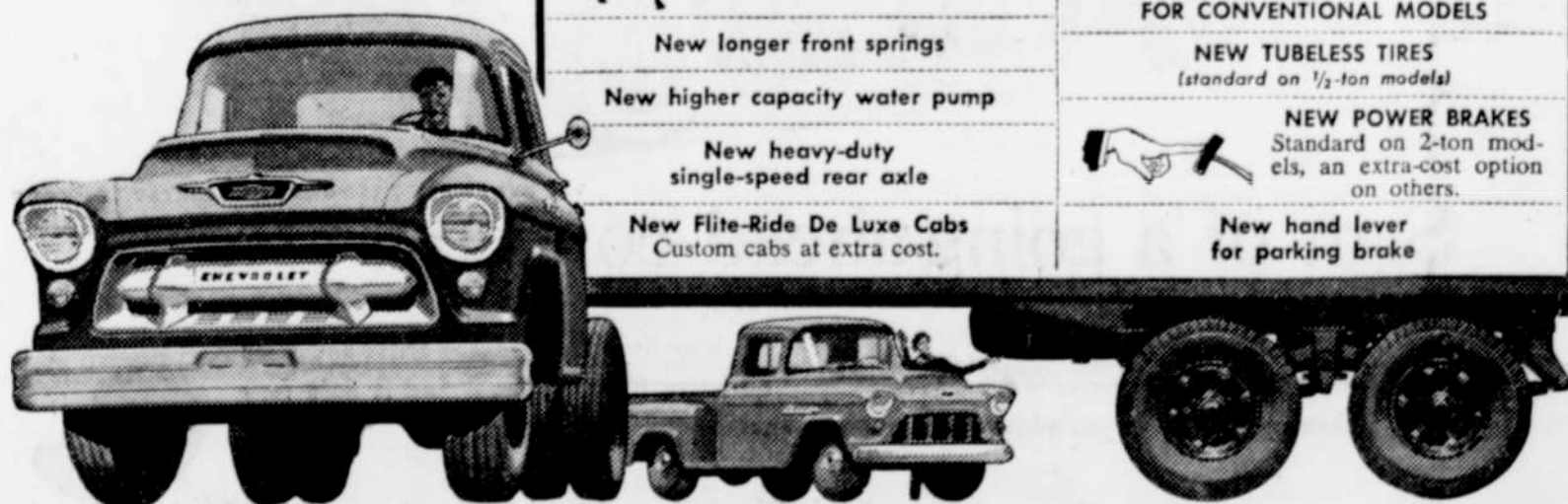
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
