Housewives Lead In Oregon's Trek To Foreign Lands

Housewives obtained the greatest number of passports issued to United States Citizens for foreign travel during the first quarter of 1955, according to information obtained by the Travel Department of the Oregon State Motor Association.

During the first three months of this year, a total of 130,928 passports was issued by the State Department, which is a new record in foreign travel on the part of Americans. For the same period last year, there were 117,400 passports issued and for 1953, 114,400.

"Passports were issued for 859 Oregonians during the first quarter of this year," the motor club reported. "This has been a banner year for foreign travel originating in Oregon, as it has for the nation as a whole, and indications are that by the end of the year, more Oregonians will have traveled abroad than during any other year."

AAA officials reported that housewives received 24,139 passports during the first quarter of this year. The next highest occupation shown in the passport list were business executives with 11,942. Close behind were clerks, secretaries, with 11,776. Next in order were retired people with 7,638 passports, while skilled labor was next with 6,651, followed by students with 6,204.

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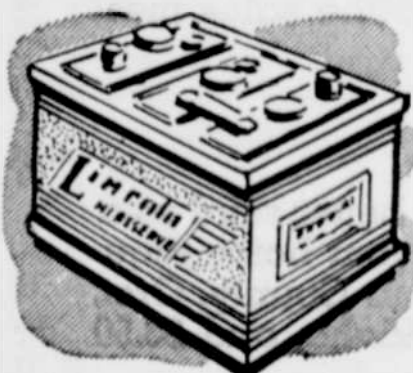
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
