Hearing Tuesday On Onion Grades

A statewide hearing to establish new minimum grades for onions will be held in the Moore hotel at Ontario Tuesday, July 26, at 2 p. m. Special attention will be given to tolerance for internal defects. Frank McKennon, plant division chief for the state department of agriculture, will conduct the hearing.

Under the new onion law effective August 3, grade labeling of onions will no longer be compulsory in Oregon with the single exception that all cull onions marketed must be labeled as culls. This means that a new minimum grade must be set up; all onions falling below the minimum will automatically be subject to labeling as culls when offered for sale or sold in Oregon.
