Plan New Tags For Carcasses

New producer tags for the movement of cattle, calves, sheep and hogs will be available from four Malheur county livestock brand inspectors after August 3, the state department of agriculture announces from Salem.

Producers may pick up the free tags from Grant E. Poulson, in Nyssa; Reuben H. Kelley, Vale; Thomas L. Skinner, Jordan Valley, or from the brand office at the Ontario Livestock Commission company yards.

Under 1955 amendments to the gasoline cowboy act, which has always required producers to tag carcasses moved from the premises where slaughtered, only one tag is necessary. Tags will no longer be required for poultry and rabbit carcasses.

Heretofore these tags have been available through the sheriff's office, but the last legislature placed the distribution in hands of the department's brand inspectors or others designated by the department. "We hope," says M. E. Knickerbrocker, animal division chief for the department, "to maintain the same high level of identification reached by the sheriffs over the state in the years they have been responsible for this work."

In readiness for the switchover, the department has printed and distributed an entirely new type of tag for producers. After August 3, the old tags will not be recognized by the state.

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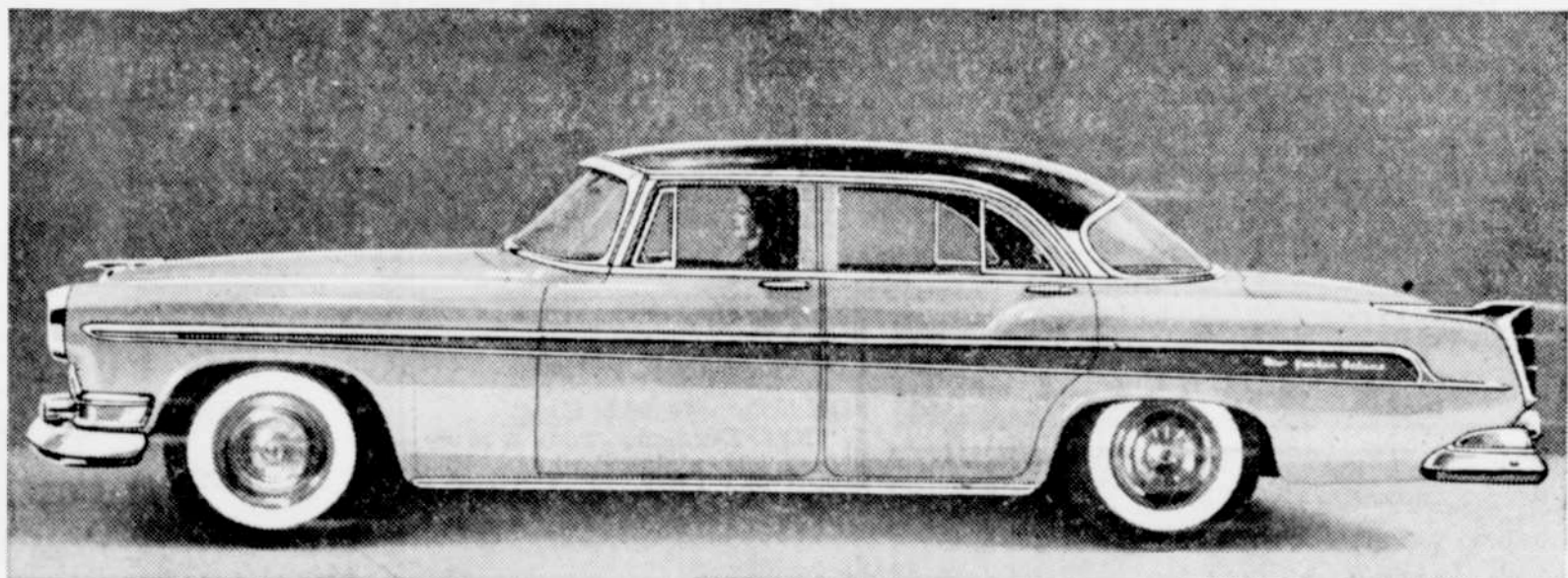
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
