(Continued from Page 1) program in which all first graders are examined each fall. Other losses will be records of first graders filed by the health department as well as compilation of all vital statistics.

Mrs. Faris' resignation followed that of Raymond Ruff, who left the position of county sanitarian May 25.

Serves 13 Years

Mrs. Faris has been county health nurse since Jan. 12, 1942 and prior to that was associated with health work in this county. She had worked for the Oregon TB and Health association seven years before coming here and in 1937 she worked with various new health and welfare programs instigated by the state. She remained here until 1939 when she went to Oregon Medical school, then she was employed in health work

in Yamhill county and in Wyoming until she returned to Malheur county in 1942.

"We have been building a good health department ever since it was started, but I now feel that it is going down hill," Mrs. Faris commented. "I feel no malice—just sick. I feel like I'm walking out on my own family, but I cannot continue under the present conditions," she went on to explain.
