Seemed kind of odd to me—but Whitey was enthusiastic. "Best idea I ever heard of," he claims. "Keeps the feed bill down—and

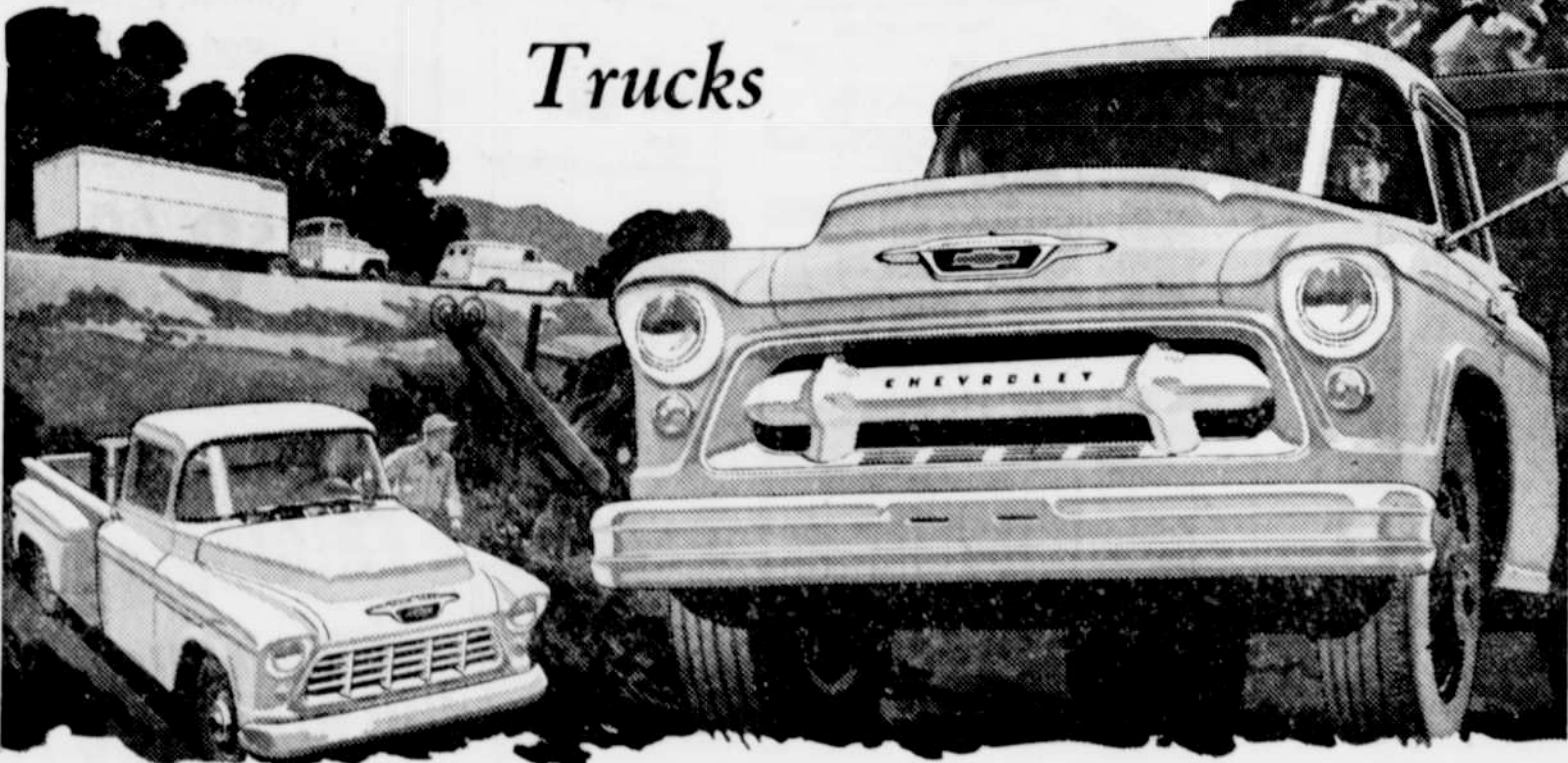
the bug population, too. Why do you suppose I never thought of it before?"

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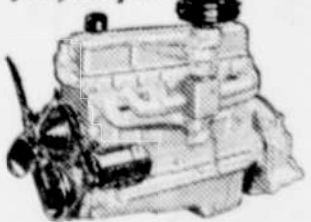
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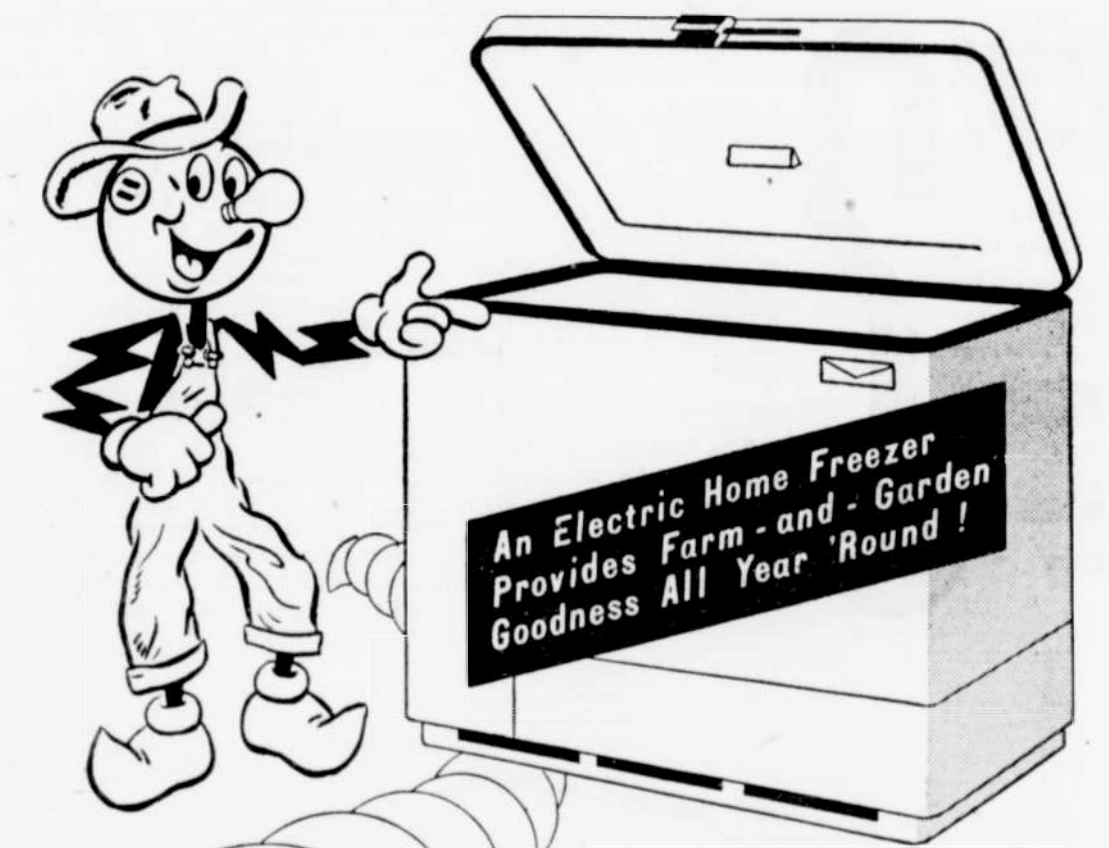


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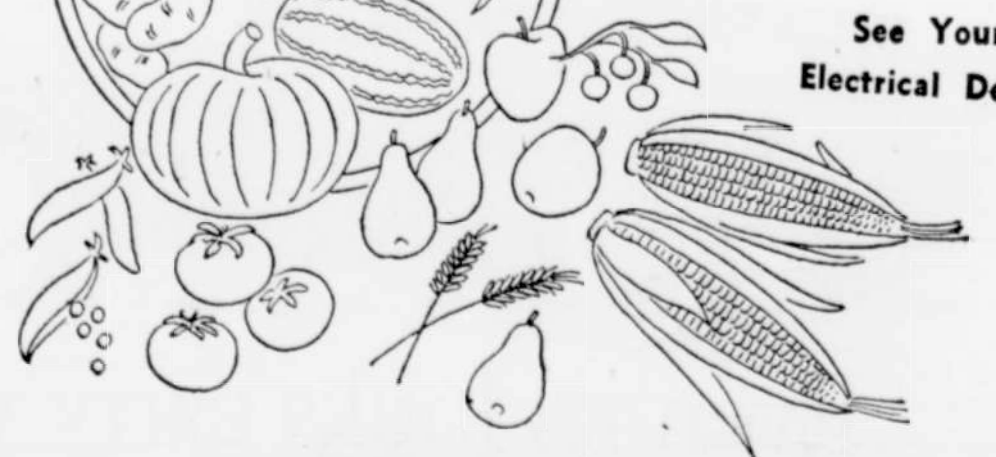
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
