5 Years Ago—Aug. 10, 1950

Don B. Moss and Marv Jeffries of the local Firestone Store, will erect a new building at Fifth and Main. — Graham B. Smith, architect on the new Nyssa school building has recommended to the directors that they accept the structure as substantially completed. The office of Supt. Henry Hartley was moved from the elementary building to the new junior high. — A potato truck driven by Mrs. Eral Beus overturned on a hill west of town caused by loose gravel. Mrs. Beus and son, Leo escaped with shock and bruises. — Don De Haven was injured at the Omar Hite ranch while working on a combine.

10 Years Ago—Aug. 9, 1945

A collection of German souvenirs, property of Pfc. Harold Hay, son of Mr. and Mrs. Royal Sanders, will be placed on display in the Journal office window. — The Nyssa Tile and Pipe Co. has started construction of a new modern pipe plant on highway 20 northwest of Nyssa. — A mooring dock was installed last week by the Nyssa Boat club at the new boat landing near the Nyssa bridge on the east side of the river. — A tentative hearing on the proposed city zoning ordinance will be held Aug. 14 at the regular council meeting.

15 Years Ago—Aug. 8, 1940

Ten gallon hats, buckaroo shirts, jeans and other western garb was the fashion for the coming Fall Festival in Nyssa Sept. 6-7. — Joe Butte, assistant at the Amalgamated Sugar company, has been transferred to the mill at Lewiston, Utah. — Construction of the underpass at Nyssa started Monday morning. 20 Years Ago—Aug. 8, 1935

Officials were of the opinion it was a pioneer child or an Indian. — Four jack hammers valued at \$190 each and a quantity of powder was stolen from the Morrison-Knudsen camp Sunday. — Dr. George Davis is taking care of the office while Dr. J. J. Sarazin and family are vacationing in Wisconsin and Michigan. — Small bass, salvaged from the Willamette river when it fell to a low level, were planted in the Owyhee reservoir. — The So & Sew club gave a miscellaneous shower for Mr. and Mrs. Orval Clack who had the misfortune to lose their house and furnishings in a fire.

Tyrene of Kentucky by Clark McMeekin is the story of a young couple in Kentucky during the violence and unrest of post-Civil War days.

Elizabeth Ogilvie's novel, Dawning of the Day, tells of the difficulties encountered by a young war widow who accepts a teaching position on an island off the coast of Maine.

Mary Heavens by Virginia Sorensen is Zina's story of her love for Dr. Niels Nielsen who came to settle and practice in the Mormon valley in Utah.

A story of the western frontier, Lord Grizzly by Frederick Manfred, depicts a frontier scout's desperate search for revenge against the men he believes abandoned him when he was attacked by a grizzly bear.
