#### 5 Years Ago—Aug. 17, 1950

The Idaho Canning Co., will open its Nyssa factory this week and will employ 175 persons. — Frank Parr resigned as a member of the school board to accept a position on the junior high faculty. Lem Wilson was appointed to succeed him. — The softball title was won by Tobler's Feed & Fuel. The winner of the sub-district title will meet the Baker-La-Grande series for the district title and the right to play at the state tournament at Pendleton. — The Nyssa Rifle and Pistol club received its charter from the National Rifle association of America. Vernon Robertson is president.

#### 10 Years Ago—Aug. 16, 1945

Retail stores will be allowed to sell certain inexpensive shoes ration free from Aug. 17 to Oct. 13. — The surrender of the Japanese Aug. 14 was celebrated in Nyssa along with the rest of the nation. The best guesser in town—George Henneman, city councilman, said three years ago the world war would end in 1945. —George Ninemire of Nyssa has purchased the Evergreen service station and garage at Council, Idaho.

#### 15 Years Ago—Aug. 15, 1940

The Nyssa volunteer fire department was called to three fires this week, the first call was at the Nyssa Trader, the second at the Sugar factory where a fire started in the bag room from an electric cutter, the third fire was the garage on the property of Mrs. Clara Brown which was totally destroyed. The first two fires were extinguished before doing much damage. — The Amalgamated Sugar company have made plans to build a \$75,000 warehouse, Ray G. Larson, district manager announced at the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce meeting. — The Eder Hard-

ware Co., will move to their new store at Second and Main streets Sunday. The Hardware company was formed at its present location in 1921.
