Elks All Stars To Lock Horns In Boise Battle

The Snake River Valley Elks' All stars will be battling Saturday evening to rack up another win against the Boise All stars in their annual football classic at Ontario field. Kick-off time will be at 8:15 and 6,000 fans are expected to be on hand for the second annual event.

In last year's tilt, attended by 4,000 fans, the SRV eleven marched over the Boise Valley squad with a 13 to 7 victory.

Proceeds are split 50-50 between two Elks non-profit organizations, the Eye clinic in Portland and the Elks' convalescent home in Boise.

Coach Ken Glore of Ontario has been putting his squad through training twice each day and has introduced his own T-formation system to be used. Until Tuesday, Glore was short on backfield material but Tony Arana and Glen Evins of Vale who were in Portland last week end to play in the Shriner all-star game, joined the team here on Tuesday for practice and will undoubtedly see action Saturday night.

The addition of Arana and Evins to the team brings the squad to the limit of 25 men.

Boise Valley shows a heavier line average with approximately 11 pounds difference per man. This difference is almost the same in the backfield as well, according to Coach Glore.

Assisting Glore with the training has been Ed Aspartite and Jack Daily. The fellows stay in Ontario each day and have lunch and dinner at a training table in the Elks' lodge.

Halftime entertainment will feature the Ontario National guard unit drill team, the Tillamook Elks band and the La-Grande drum and bugle corp. Featured with the Tillamook Elks band will be Lovey Ward, three time winner of the national baton twirling title of Aberdeen, Wash. Miss Ward is classed as the world's top performer in her field.

Prior to the game, the Ontario National unit will feature a color guard.
