CARS ARE MY LINE

Even people who've never been to Paris have heard about the crazy way Paris cab drivers scoot about and the way they lean constantly on their horns.

Songs have been written about dodging the taxicabs, their constantly bleating horns being music to a tourist's ears.

But the traffic toll in Paris is terrible and a little while ago the police decided that Paris drivers would be better off leaning on their brakes instead of their horns. They outlawed the blowing of those famous horns.

A lot of people thought the accident rate would go 'way up. After all, with horns blowing, you at least knew what hit you!

But the anti-horn edict had a wonderful effect, and perhaps there are some lessons in it for us over here. Although the number of vehicles in Paris was increasing by almost 8,000 a month, the number of accidents after the ban on blasting dropped by 25 percent.

That was the average figure for all kinds of street accidents—the number of accidents to motorists went down by a phenomenal 32 percent!

I wonder if we have something to learn from the French. Horns and brakes are both essential safety devices but I wonder if more of us should Break the Horn Habit and use the Brakes instead.
