This note is being written with a thankful heart and in grateful appreciation of the wonderful treatment accorded myself and my family during our stay in the town of Nyssa.

I am a Naval Officer stationed in Jacksonville, Florida. During the night of September 6 I received a long distance call that my mother, Mrs. Orpha L. Brown of Chicago, Illinois and my brother, Harold Gill of Anaconda, Montana, had been involved in a serious car accident near Nyssa. This news came as a terrible blow, most especially since the distance involved is considerable. I immediately contacted the hospital at Nyssa and at that moment began to encounter the most wonderful spirit of helpfulness and sincere courtesy it has ever been my good fortune to enjoy. Dr. Morgan of the Malheur Memorial hospital came to the phone and gave me all the facts surrounding the accident, the condition of my loved ones and what was being done for them. He assured me that nothing would be lacking for their welfare and from that time until I could begin my trip to Nyssa kept me informed of their condition. My mother was removed to Boise to the St. Alphonsus hospital there as soon as she was adjudged able to make the trip. There is no doubt whatever that the skill and judgement of Dr. Morgan saved my mother's life and enabled my brother to be conditionally discharged from the hospital. In addition to this the friendly and sincere treatment accorded by him, and by

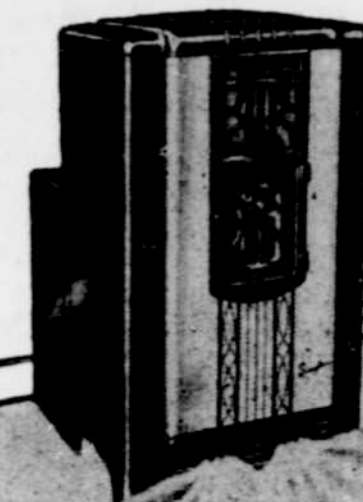

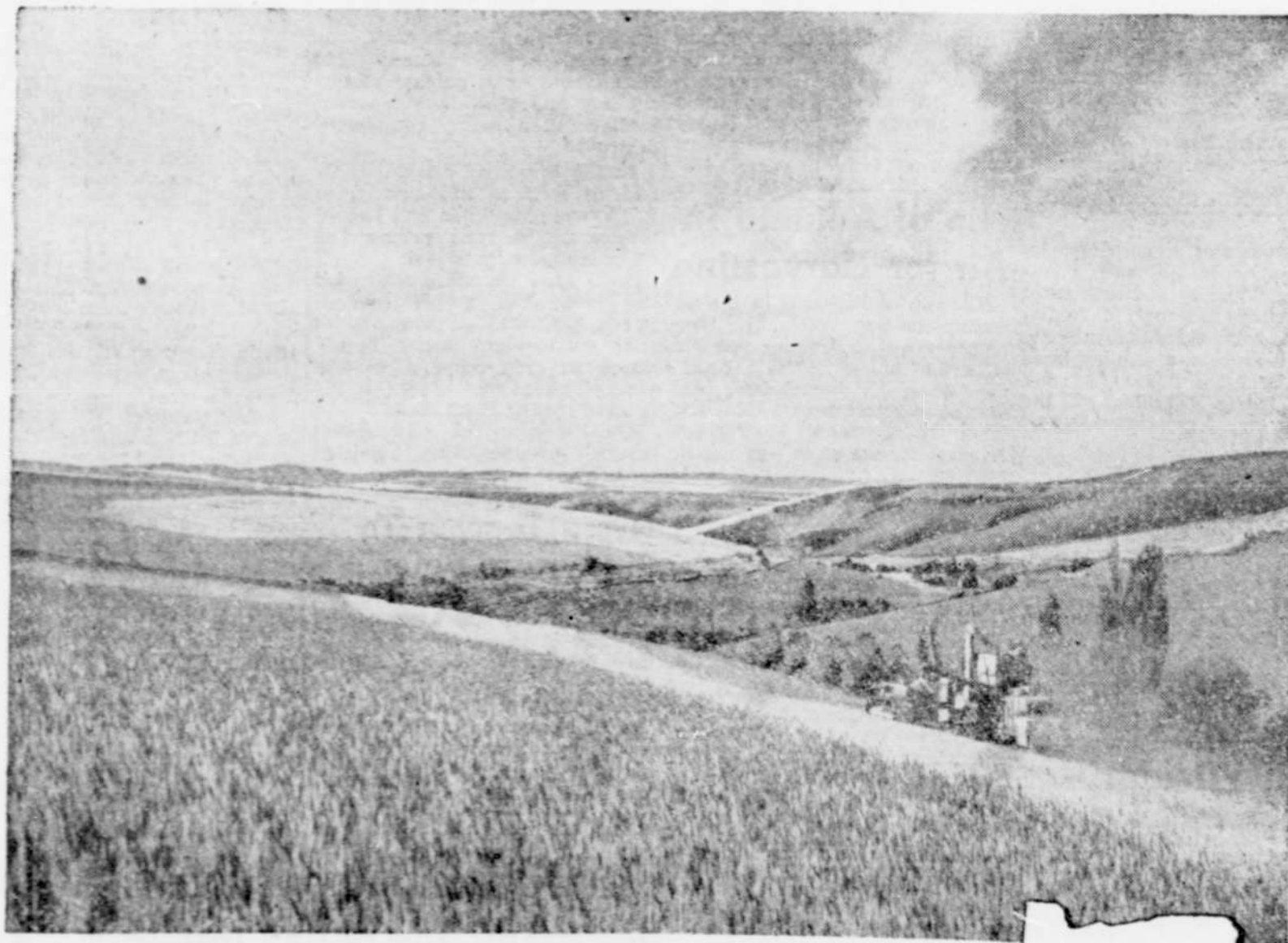
