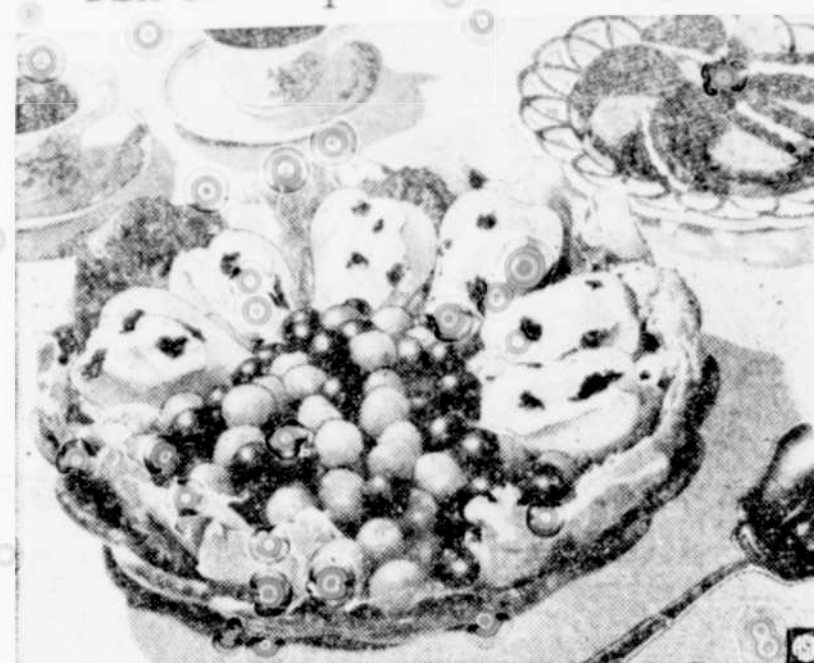
The afternoon reception was from three to five. At the evening reception a program was presented by grandchildren and friends.
