Cloud Seeding Program Conducted On Owyhee Project Brings Extra Runoff

The cloud seeding program conducted early this year for the Owyhee project resulted in an estimated extra 115,000 acre feet of runoff water during the season through September, according to the report issued by North American Weather Consultants of Oregon, who conducted the cloud seeding program, affecting water users from Marsing to Weiser.

The program, conducted during the period Jan. 15 through June 13, was based on the operation of 24 ground based propane-operated silver iodide generators which were active for a total of 3,714 hours to increase precipitation in the target area of the Owyhee watershed.

Over the greater portion of the Owyhee watershed area during the period of the cloud seeding operations precipitation varied from 100 percent to 120 percent normal, according to statistics compiled by North American Weather Consultants based on official U. S. Weather Bureau records. These values contrast sharply with below-normal precipitation in the similar climatic areas surrounding the Owyhee watershed target area. For example, the report shows watersheds of the Burnt and Malheur rivers to the northwest of the target area had 60 percent to 70

percent of normal precipitation for the same period while the Humboldt river watershed to the south, in northern Nevada, had 50 percent to 80 percent of normal precipitation.

A detailed statistical analysis performed on the snow course records for the target area indicated that the snow courses in the Silver City area had 294 percent more snow on April 1 than would be predicted in the absence of the cloud seeding program. Snow courses in the extreme south-eastern part of the watershed received 36 percent more snow by April 1 than the predicted value. The overall impact of the cloud seeding program on the target area snowpack indicated a 34 percent excess over the predicted value.

An analysis made of precipitation in the entire area during the past 20 years shows that for the seasonal interval from February through June, the areas bounding the Owyhee watershed to the west and to the south had from 15 to 20 seasons where the precipitation was greater than during the 1955 period. On the other hand most of the Owyhee watershed area had only 10 such wetter seasons and in the central part of the Owyhee watershed area there were but five such wetter seasons during the past 20 years.
