The Power Fight Goes On

The recently completed series of debates between Sen. Richard Neuberger and Congressman Sam Coon probably changed few minds regarding the public vs. private power issue. According to reports from both sides, only two groups of people made up the audience in various places where debates were held: those with strong convictions for a high dam in Hells Canyon and those with just as strong convictions in favor of power dams by private capital.

There are several questions that the senator has not answered from the public platform. What assurance has he that Congress, whether Democratic or Republican, would appropriate money for all federal dams, including Hells Canyon? Would the senator and those who will not compromise for anything but all-federal dams prefer to bypass an opportunity to have private capital invested with no assurance of federal appropriations just for the sake of the argument that power sites belong to the people? If the chief argument in favor of "cheap power" would attract new industry here, isn't there danger that the big business that would be attracted might be as "ruthless" as the allegedly private power concerns and would squeeze all small business out? Does anyone have concrete evidence that any industry has refused to come to the lower Snake river valley because of exorbitant power costs?

Figures dealing with kilowatt hour output issued by the two sides do not agree. One or both sides are either guessing at the amount of power from the two potentials, or they are deliberately issuing false statements.
