Bulldogs Take 32-27 Win From Weiser Friday

The Nyssa Bulldogs chalked up their first victory of the season in their first away-from-home conference game at Weiser Friday night by upsetting the Wolverines 32-27. The tilt was in connection with Weiser's homecoming celebration.

Larry Schenk opened the scoring with a touchdown in the first quarter, the first of four he made during the game. Joe Sanders added the extra point and Schenk threw a 30-yard pass to Vernon Bond who brought in Nyssa's second score in the first quarter. The Bulldogs retained that lead until the last quarter when the Wolverines brought in 20 points.

Weiser's first score came in the second quarter when Leon Peterson ran 90 yards after receiving the kickoff. In the second and third frames Schenk scored three more times; in the second he ran around end on a 43-yard play for a TD and in the final quarter he raced 85 yards for a score that was repeated when he hauled in a 12-yard pass from Weiser in the end zone.

Ken Haryaguchi was responsible for Weiser's three touchdowns in the final quarter by running 55 yards to Nyssa's goal post then threw a touchdown pass to Peterson and another to Joe Karmos. The hard-hitting and game-winning Ontario Tigers come to Nyssa Friday night for a tilt with the Bulldogs.

The Nyssa justice is one of 27 adults enrolling for special Spanish classes being held at the high school one night each week. He stated that a majority of his summer cases involve Mexican migrant workers, many of whom can speak no English in the event of a traffic violation, they readily understand that they must pay \$7.50, for instance, but they don't know why. Judge Graham explained, "If I learn to speak some Spanish I can explain some of the problems and better help with their domestic issues that frequently go to court unnecessarily," he went on to say.

Letter From 28 Churches Praises Sheriff Elfering

A letter, signed by pastors and heads of 28 different churches representing approximately 8000 people in Ontario, Nyssa and Vale has been sent to the county's three newspapers and the Ontario radio station commending Sheriff John Elfering for efforts to close houses of prostitution. The Rev. John Briehl, pastor of Faith Lutheran church, Nyssa, stated that this definitely is not a church crusade, but is a means of giving credit where it is due when action favorable to the letter's signers has been taken.

Rev. Briehl said that the public is prone to criticize "when nothing is done" then fails to acknowledge activities that meet with its approval. The letter was circulated by the Nyssa pastor in the county's three towns for signatures of ministers or heads of congregations. Because of time element, no rural congregations were contacted, Rev. Briehl said.

The letter in its entirety reads: We believe that prostitution is basically wrong and further, that its existence in any area can do nothing but corrupt the area with related vice.

Representing our respective congregations in this county, we compliment the effective effort of Sheriff Elfering and his staff in moving toward an eradication of this vice. We emphatically endorse this endeavor and look toward further decisive action by the office of the District Attorney in abating the continuance of this crime.

The action of the Sheriff's office and the anticipated action of the office of the District Attorney has the unqualified thanks and support of each of us, our respective congregations, and, we believe, the support of all thinking people who are trying to make the Lower Snake River Valley a better place in which to live.

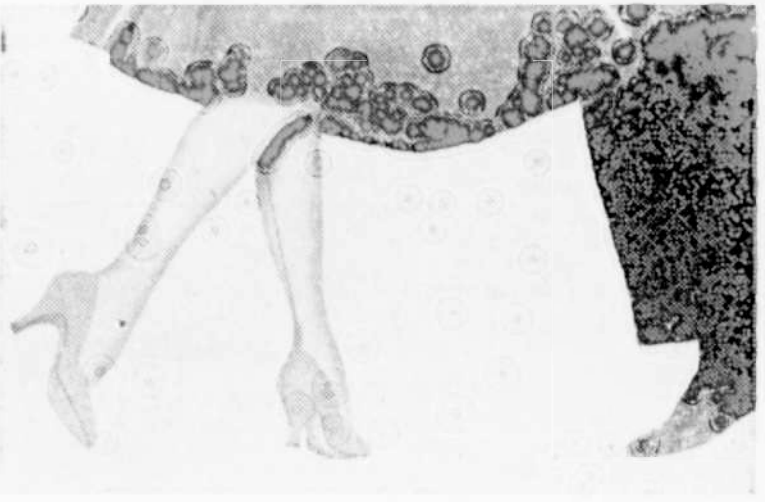
