

Community Concert Series to Open Friday With Symphonette Program

The Malheur Community Concert association will open the 1955-56 season on Friday, Oct. 21, with the concert of the Longines Symphonette.

This ensemble is a 31-piece orchestra which is about one-third the size of a fully-constituted symphony. It includes every instrument of a symphony orchestra but with some of them, notably the strings, in smaller number.

Each musician in the symphonette is considered something of a virtuoso in his own right which makes the size of the orchestra enjoyably adequate.

Music lovers have been listening to the Longines Symphonette on radio for the past ten years, under the brilliant leadership of Misha Piastro, founder and conductor of the group. It is now in its sixth season of tours.

10 Years Ago—Sept. 27, 1945

Kerby, captain in the Medical Corps in the army for four years, including 33 months overseas, has returned to Nyssa to resume his practice in the Sarazin clinic. — Adrian was threatened by fire Friday night when a short in the wiring of an electric coffee maker caused a fire in Emery's Cafe burning the counter and filling the Eder Hardware with smoke. Adrian is virtually without fire fighting equipment. — Harry Sandquist of Lakeview has been selected as Malheur County agent succeeding R. E. Brooke who resigned to enter private business. — Nyssa and vicinity will swing back to mountain standard time Sept. 30 from Pacific war time. — Mr. and Mrs. Ersal Beus have purchased 90-acres of the old Marshall place and have moved to the property.

45 Years Ago Sept. 22, 1910

Nyssa people are catching the "oil fever". Oil is coming up in every barrel at the Eastern Oregon oil well and has been sent to Baker for analysis and is reported 75 percent oil. — At the regular meeting of the Nyssa Commercial club, J. H. Hill was appointed secretary. — Mrs. J. M. Jenkins reported returns on her 160-acre farm known as the Robert Van Gilse ranch 2 miles northwest of Nyssa which she purchased for \$12,000. The first year her prunes sold for \$12,000, the original price of the land. This year the prunes netted \$12,000 and the apple crop is valued at \$15,000 and the hay was sold for \$3,320.

With winter upon us, and temperatures beginning to drop, the most common sound along any residential street is the grind, grind, grind of engines that are hard to start.

Mixed with this melody is the sound of muffled grumbling from drivers who are slowly, and systematically wearing down their batteries with this early-morning grind.

The battery, more than likely, can be blamed for most hard winter starts. When the temperature drops to zero, a battery in good condition will deliver only 40 per cent of its normal power.

All the more reason, then, to have us check your battery, remove the corrosive deposits around it and make sure you have large enough electrical cables. (Smaller cables put up more resistance to the flow of current).

Loose, frayed or corroded cable that you may not be able to see with a quick look under the hood can suddenly make a car hard to start in winter when it has been acting perfectly all summer. All these things rob the electrical system of voltage—and in winter the battery voltage may drop to 4 or less, instead of 6 or slightly more (on most cars).

Under these circumstances, your engine may be turning over when you press the starter, but there's not enough voltage left to produce a spark.

There are lots of reasons for hard winter starts, of course, some of which I'll discuss in later columns, but the electrical system is usually at the heart of it. The thing to do is come in and talk it over, we'll go over all the trouble spots with you.

Also while you are around the place take a look at some of our used cars. The batteries have been checked and the electrical system is A-1. These cars will start for you this winter. 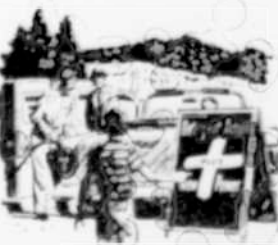
