Production Bred Jerseys On Sale Saturday, Oct. 29

Production bred pedigreed Jersey heifers and one 2½ year old bull out of dams with official records up to 874 pounds of butterfat are consigned to the 6th annual Oregon Jersey Cattle club heifer investment sale, to be held on the Malheur county fairgrounds, Ontario, Sat. Oct. 29, according to M. N. Tibbles, Salem, president of the club and manager of the sale. Arrangements are made with cooperation from the Malheur county Jersey Cattle club, Lewis Johnson, Vale, president.

The lone bull is out of a dam with a record of 784 pounds fat as a junior 4 year old, while three heifers are from dams with 365-day records above 800 pounds. Four other heifers are from dams with 305-day records above 600 pounds fat, 8 are from dams with records between 500 and 600 pounds and 9 others are from dams with records between 400 and 500 pounds fat. The balance are from young cows with incompleting first-calf records.

The sale is scheduled to begin at 12:30 p.m. with lunch available at fairgrounds prior to sale. Roy A. Benson, Hillsboro, will auction the sale. Animals will be available for pre-sale inspection beginning Thursday, Oct. 27, at the fairgrounds.

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½ cup sifted, finely
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½ cup raisins or chopped
nuts
1½ cups sifted all-purpose
flour
½½ teaspoon double-acting
type baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
½½ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ cup sugar
½ cup modified Carnation
Evaporated Milk
¼ cup water
1 egg
2 tablespoons melted
shortening
Place melted butter in 8" x 8" x 2" square pan. Spread brown
sugar and raisins or nuts over butter. Sift flour, baking powder,
salt, cinnamon, and sugar into bowl. Beat together Carnation,
water, egg and melted shortening; add to dry ingredients.
Stir until combined (15 strokes). Drop dough by spoonfuls over
brown sugar and raisins. Bake in hot oven (400 deg. F.) for
25-30 minutes or until brown. Invert on plate and allow the
syrup to drain onto cake before removing the pan (about 1
minute). Serve immediately.
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
