Roy Smith Dies Suddenly At Home Of Father Here

Roy Lee Smith, 48, son of J. C. Smith of Nyssa, died suddenly Tuesday morning at the home of his father in Nyssa where he had been visiting.

Mr. Smith was born April 13, 1907 at Peru, Kas. and moved with his parents to Oklahoma in 1910. He was graduated from the Tulsa high school in 1925 after serving as senior class president. He attended Oklahoma State University.

He served overseas in World War II with the 9th Army in Germany. He was married to Ruth L. Sebree in 1945. Since leaving the army he had been working as a traveling salesman in several western states.

Surviving besides his wife and father are one brother, Howard Smith of Nyssa, and a sister, Mrs. Jack Fields of Barger, Texas.

Funeral services are pending.

Nyssa's Bulldogs lost to Ontario's Tigers, last Friday night, by a score of 52-14.

The game was wide open from the beginning with fullback Stan Olson and halfback Jerry Doman, Ontario's scoring men, eluding the Nyssa eleven for a total of 5 touchdowns, the first half. Doman making three and Olson bagging another two.

At the half Ontario led 31-0, over the outclassed Bulldogs. They then put in their other men.

Doman ran a total of 60 yards to account for three more runs. Olson ran 110 yards for an additional two.

Ontario scored again when a 32 yard pass from Doman to Ontario end Roger Benson was completed and Benson stepped across the goal line.

Ontario's other two scores were made, on a run of 30 yards by halfback Earl Doman, and a 12 yard hike by Tony Keller, halfback.

Conversions for the Ontario team were made by Jerry Hall, who kicked three. Also Reed Vestral passing to Mark Cromwell.

During the final period Nyssa Bulldogs began to spark and Frankie Morris hopped through a hole in the Ontario line from the 1 yard line, with Dennis Savage diving over for the other Nyssa tally.

Savage made one of the conversions and Dirk Rhinehart flipped the pig skin over to Vernon Pond for the other extra point.

Pheasant, Duck Season Opens For Gunners On Sat.

Scattergun devotees will have their day Saturday when waterfowl and upland bird gunning will get under way throughout the state of Oregon.

Gunners can look for another good season with surveys indicating population increases with most species of waterfowl and a stable population of pheasants, quail, and partridge throughout the upland game bird habitat.

In eastern Oregon, the season will be open for pheasants, quail, and Hungarian partridge extending through Nov. 13.

Bag limits on pheasants will be 4 cocks per day, 12 in possession. In eastern Oregon, the bag limit on quail and partridge will be 10 per day in the aggregate, 20 in possession. West of the Cascades the bag limit on quail will be 5 per day in the aggregate, 10 in possession.

The waterfowl season will extend from Oct. 22 through Jan. 9 for all species of ducks and geese except brant where the season will be from Dec. 1 through Feb. 10. The jacksnipe season will extend from Nov. 27 through Dec. 11.

Daily bag limits for ducks remain at 9, 15 in possession, providing such daily bag or possession limit contains not less than 3 widgeons or pintails. One wood duck and one hooded merganser will be allowed in the daily bag limit.

Bag limit for geese is 6 daily.

Arthur House entered the veterans hospital in Boise last week for observation and possible medical attention.

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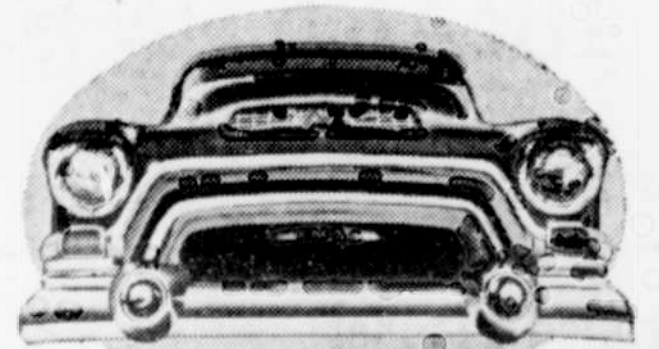
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
