Men of St. Paul's Church Unite to Remodel Their Historic Structure

"Six days shall thou labor. . . . And on the seventh day, last Sunday, it was kept Holy by men of the St. Paul's Episcopal church congregation, who gave service to the Lord in a spontaneous demonstration of adherence to their Godhood.

They spent most of the Sabbath with sweat on their brows as they performed an act of love, not labor, in the moving and remodeling of their church at the corner of Fifth street and Bower avenue.

The church has been swung around so that it now faces on Bower, instead of Fifth, and has been set atop a concrete basement which is large enough to provide a youth center, a parish hall and community room.

Elaborate plans are being made for landscaping of the entire property, with sidewalks to be laid within the grounds, and with a parking lot at the rear so that church-goers can be within just a few steps of their place of worship.

The moving job was done by Lynn Snodgrass, but when the building was set in place on its new foundation, most of the men of the congregation met and determined to set to work with a will to prepare the outside walls for a face-lifting job.

Brick veneer will be laid up to the windows, and the remainder of the church, after repair, will be painted an attractive color. There will be a large new front porch, to be overhung by a gable.

St. Paul's is considered a landmark of Nyssa. It has long served as a community meeting place for people of all creeds, and even
