The 7 Prize Bicycles

Each active candidate in this campaign is sure of earning a prize bicycle or a cash commission as there will be one prize bicycle and four cash commissions for each five active candidates.

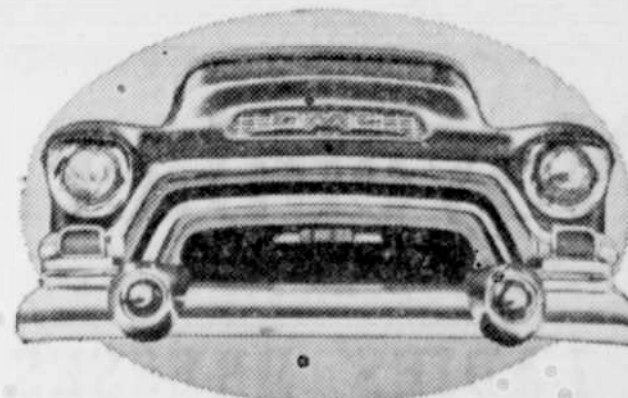
