

National Education Week Observed Adrian High Has With Three "Back-to-school" Nights Successful Open House, Benefit

"Know your school" was the theme for the back-to-school nights held in the grade, junior high and high school divisions of Nyssa schools during the past week in observance of National Education week.

Approximately 250 parents and teachers attended Nyssa grade school open house Thursday evening at the old gym. Walter McPartland, grade school principal was in charge of the program which covered the subject of reading in the grades.

One teacher from each elementary grade presented a short explanation of the importance phonics play in teaching children of each grade level to read. Mrs. Lennie Berkley represented first grade; Mrs. Eulah McConnell, second; Mrs. Maude Teague, third; Mrs. Eva Chadwick, fourth; Mrs. Hazel Lane, fifth and Mrs. Alice Moncur, sixth.

improve the services offered by the school.

A few recommendations and suggestions were presented for consideration of the school board, administration and school staff which in most instances would improve the school program beyond the minimum standards.

It was suggested that the shop program might be expanded into a "general shop" set-up which would take in activities as welding, electricity, plumbing, cement work, etc., in addition to the usual woodworking, after completion of the new industrial arts plant; that a few more of the state subject-area handbooks be made available to local teachers and that as enrollment increases a foreign language might be added to the subject offerings.

The report pointed out that study of a foreign language in high school is valuable for its cultural merits, because some colleges require it before graduation and two years of high school work is acceptable and for its utilitarian and vocational importance in communities where such foreign elements as migratory laborers are present.

It was recommended that a written statement of the school's philosophy be formulated to better evaluate its objectives and methods. The advisability of changing the present senior mathematics course, an elective subject, to one taken only by those deficient in the field of mathematics should be considered. Also, when enlarging the school program it might be advisable to add physical science to the curriculum.

It was also mentioned that as the enrollment increases, it would seem desirable to list one member of the staff as dean of girls with released time for these duties which now are shared by a number of the staff women.

of health public nurse; Miss Christine Ling, health education consultant of the board of health, and Mrs. Blaylock.

Prior to the court's decision to approve the hiring of a sanitarian and to ask the people to approve a special tax levy for a health department, Dr. Hughes told the court, "Nothing is so important as good health," and that the press of the county should help tell the people of the need of a county health department. Judge Chester told the visitors that Malheur county's doctors should get together and decide the needs and tell the people all about them.

Dr. Osgood pointed out that

the public doesn't realize that a health department is economically sound, and that it could have cut down on the number of cases of polio, although there could be no guarantee there would be no polio. He cited the expenditure of approximately \$2,000 per polio patient of an overall cost of about \$30,000 during the current epidemic. Many other illnesses and diseases can be better controlled and in some cases avoided with a proper health department, Dr. Osgood asserted.

was appointed by the councilmen, but names could not be made public until each person had accepted. The commission will make recommendations for the street system, zoning, sub-division regulations, land use studies, serve as a board

of adjustment and as an advisory board to the council and city manager, Middaugh reported.

Another proposed ordinance will revise all existing sanitation regulations and require closed garbage containers throughout town, among other regulations.

The first reading of an ordinance was held for the sale of a 20 foot strip of property adjacent to an alley to the Episcopal church. Another first reading was for an ordinance to empower the city to dispose of vehicles abandoned 48 hours or more on streets, alleys or other public places.

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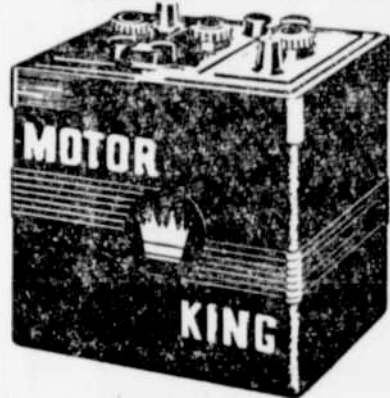
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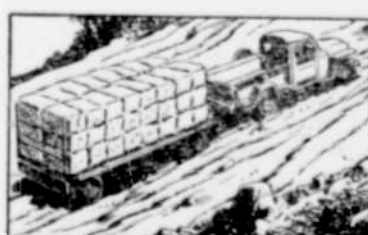
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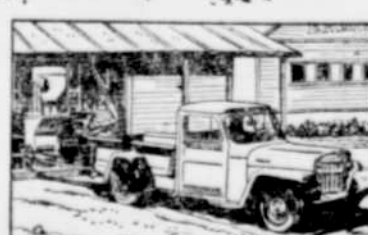
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
