Health Officers Release Report On Sanitation

Dr. Sam Osgood, representative of the Oregon State Board of Health and Dr. Grant B. Hughes, Malheur county health officer assured residents of the county that there is nothing in the present sanitation survey to account for the recent outbreak of poliomyelitis. This statement contained in a summary prepared by the two officials from the reports of sanitation officials of the state health departments of Idaho and Oregon.

A thorough check of health conditions in the community followed recent outbreak of polio which reached epidemic proportions in the Nyssa area.

The officials advised that two immediate actions of real importance are improvement of individual and community garbage disposal and enforcement of municipal ordinances for the elimination of improperly constructed privies and the extension of city sewers.

They stated that the general problems of sanitation are typical throughout the communities of Malheur county and stressed the need for a qualified sanitarian and re-establishment of a full time health department for the county. Both urban and rural residents need to be provided with adequate and well maintained disposal sites and compulsory routine collection and or disposal of all garbage and refuse should be port emphasized.

The need for improved individual water supplies is county wide, however the municipal supplies are safe.

The need for proper and safe individual sewage disposal is county wide. Particular reference is made to sewage drainage into irrigation ditches and other waterways.

There is a statutory requirement and need for supervision over all public eating and drinking establishments county wide and evidence that the sanitation of eating and drinking establishments has deteriorated in the past several months.

Due to the type of agricultural crops produced and the related processing industries, a problem of insect infestation exists seasonally in the valley area. Flies are known to be important in the spread of dysentery. The presence of mosquito-borne encephalitis has been demonstrated here in the past.

The major problem is one of fly populations resulting from poor garbage and premise sanitation. Reports indicate a heavy infestation existed during August and October. Livestock feeding pens and food processing plants must strive to improve house-keeping and premise sanitation. Wastes and manure should routinely be removed. During the summer and early fall months, the sanitation program may be augmented by a chemical insecticide program to reduce the fly and gnat population.

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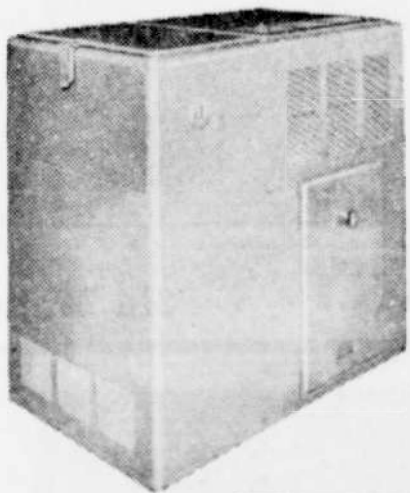
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
