Arthur Johnson of Bremerton, Wash., is visiting at the Ora Newgen home.

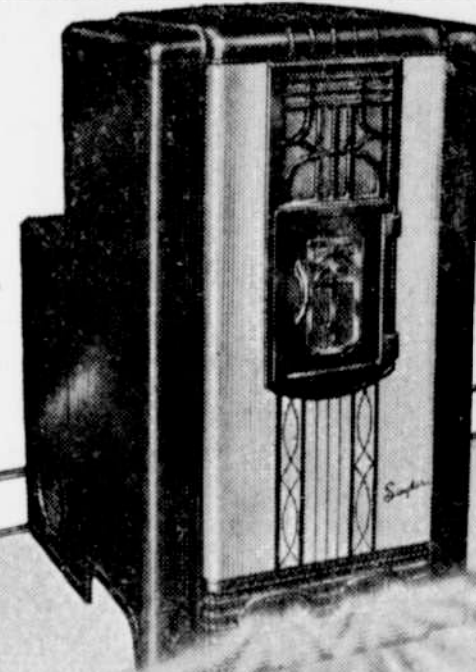
