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Special Education Teachers Represent Schools at Meeting

Mrs. J. W. Rigney, Nyssa, and Miss Mary Ann Edwards, Ontario, attended the fall meeting of the Oregon Speech and Hearing Association which was held in the Hotel Gearhart at Gearhart, Ore. Saturday, Oct. 30.

Hugh Russell, director of the speech center at Eastern Oregon College of Education in LaGrande, presided over the meeting. Subjects discussed were the functional factors in organic speech disorders, evaluation of some therapy and practices, group therapy in the regular classroom and listening skill as a part of the speech learning process.

Guest speaker of the day was Robert Harrington, Ph. D., speech pathologist, Orthopedic hospital, Los Angeles, Calif. The subject of his address was "Speech Problems in Cerebral Palsy." Dr. Harrington is an authority in the education of children who have speech handicaps due to cerebral palsy. During his lecture he introduced interesting ideas pertaining to the use of artificial respirators in training children to breathe in a manner conducive to better speech. Special emphasis was placed upon the need for such children to receive early training before the speech patterns are formed. A number of slides showing the various breathing patterns of cerebral palsied children were shown. Dr. Harrington also presented statistical facts illustrating the various stages of progress which can occur when consistent training is given.

The meeting was well attended by representatives from the various schools throughout the state where Special Education is a part of the school program.

A lifetime resident of Nyssa, Ernest Calvin Wilson, Jr., was born here April 2, 1917. He graduated from Nyssa high school with the class of 1935. He attended one year at Eastern Oregon College of Education and graduated from the University of Oregon with a BS degree in business administration in 1939. He joined his father and two brothers in their Nyssa department store in 1947.

He was married to Madge Reynolds of Nyssa August 9, 1948 in the LDS temple in Idaho Falls.

Mr. Wilson was an active member of the LDS Second Ward, the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce, Lion's Club of which he was past president, Nyssa Volunteer Fire Department and the Eagles Lodge. A sports enthusiast and athlete, he played on the Nyssa softball and basketball teams.

In high school he was a star baseball and basketball player and active in college baseball his freshman year and intramural sports during the remainder of college.

Surviving him are his wife and three children, Alice, six; Norman, four and LeAnne, three; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Wilson and two brothers, Robert and Lloyd, all of Nyssa.

Services were conducted Tuesday at 2 p. m. in the LDS Second Ward chapel with Bishop Lloyd Lewis conducting. Interment was in the Nyssa cemetery under the direction of Lienkaemper's.

cars ARE MY Line

It's mighty annoying, sitting there on a winter morning, grinding away on the starter. You know your battery is in good shape, and you've had the electrical system checked for loose connections and big enough cables (something I pointed out here a little while ago).

Your battery is in good shape—but it soon won't be with much more of this kind of starting.

So, let's see what happens when you're grinding away on a winter morning. The battery is less efficient in the first place, and congealed oil puts an extra load on the starting system.

The valve stems may get sticky and not close properly. As a result, compression is lost. And the compressing of gas and air into a tight space within the cylinder does the vital job of heating the mixture up an extra 400 or 500 degrees. At that heat, you don't need much spark to set it off.

Even with compression lost, the mixture may ignite, and then you find it hasn't enough power to keep the engine turning over.

Two things need to be done. It's here that the importance of using the right weight of oil comes in. Come around to see us—before trouble sets in if you can—and we'll troubleshoot for winter starting headaches and put in the right grade of oil.

Secondly, this is the time of year when it's sometimes a good idea to put in some top cylinder oil through the spark plug holes or intake manifold to free those sticky valve stems. We'll do it for you, too.
