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Birth of a Region's BRIGHT NEW FUTURE

Progress for the Snake River Valley is being born in Hells Canyon. New supplies of electric power to spark the continued growth and development of communities, industry and agriculture are on the way. At long last, it's FULL SPEED AHEAD in Hells Canyon — good news for everyone.

Design plans for the Brownlee and Oxbow dams on the middle Snake have been approved by the Federal Power Commission. Monster bulldozers and power shovels are already cutting a new road into the canyon, and work at the power sites will soon be under way.

An estimated \$133,000,000 and 18,800,000 man-hours of labor will be required to bring the 3-dam project to completion. A total of nearly 800,000 kilowatts' capacity will be installed initially, an ultimate capacity of 1,175,000 kilowatts of new energy for the benefit of the area.

Following a policy to which Idaho Power has rigidly adhered through years of service, the projects will fully protect irrigation water rights of present and future agricultural development upstream.

A bright new future for the Snake River Valley of Idaho and Oregon as well as the Northwest is wrapped up in these projects—new jobs, plentiful electricity to meet the growing needs of population and industry at rates a third less than the national average, a higher standard of living for every family, and greater productivity for industry and farms.

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
